

## Noxious Weeds Bylaw Revision FEEDBACK FORM







Thank you for participating in this open house. The data will be used to help us update the Noxious Weeds Bylaw, design educational material, and identify priorities and preferences for weed management in Saanich. These concepts are based on the results of public input, research and consultation from a previous open house and survey. Near the end of 2014, staff will bring forward a report to Council proposing revisions to the bylaw and a bylaw administration policy. Your responses will remain completely anonymous.

## What does the bylaw say now?

Every owner of real property in the Municipality of Saanich shall clear such real property of all brush, noxious weeds or other vegetation which because of their condition are likely to spread to or become a nuisance to other real property in the vicinity or which are so unkempt as to be unsightly to nearby residents.

## What do you think of these concepts under discussion?

<b>1.</b> All properties <i>manage</i> the spread of listed invasive plants from their <b>property boundaries</b> including via seeds, vegetative growth, soil removal, and during disposal/vehicular transportation according to <i>Saanich Best Management Practices</i> .
2. Ivy to be managed when growing up trees
<b>3.</b> All properties <i>permanently remove</i> <b>Prevent</b> and <b>Eradicate</b> Species from their properties according to Saanich Best Management Practices as well as any other listed plants which are hazardous to <b>human and animal health.</b>
<b>4.</b> All properties <i>manage</i> <b>Contain</b> and <b>Control</b> species where <i>Environmentally Significant Areas</i> occur.
<b>5.</b> Properties subject to <b>development applications</b> could be subject to all sections of this bylaw and would require a management and restoration plan in order to prevent the spread and return of <b>Prevent</b> and <b>Eradicate</b> plants.
