2007 Official Community (General) Plan Review

The Official Community Plan (OCP) is the principal policy document that Council uses to make decisions on matters such as land use, growth management, transportation and mobility, economic development, infrastructure, housing needs and protecting the environment.

Periodically, the OCP needs to be reviewed by Council, the public, staff and other key stakeholders, to determine:

- 1) If the vision, goals and objectives of the document are still valid, and;
- 2) Where the document may need to be altered to reflect changes in our community.

The OCP review will focus specifically on the General Plan which provides the over-riding policy framework from a broad municipal perspective, whereas the Local Area Plans are more detailed, neighbourhood-focused policy documents.

The majority of the Plan's goals, objectives and policies are still

valid and as such, will require little to no alteration.

In terms of the review, greater attention will be focused on the following areas:

- External forces that affect the community and future planning in a significant manner (i.e. growth pressures, climate change, protecting the environment, and aging of our population);
- Major & Neighbourhood Centers;
- Federal, Provincial and Municipal policy changes that require amendments be made to the OCP, and;
- Updating the format of the document, including photographs and diagrams to better illustrate the Plan's goals and objectives.

Participation in this important review process is both encouraged and welcomed.

The first opportunities for the public to provide input were undertaken in May. We encourage you to watch for notices in the "Saanich News" and on Saanich's website in the fall, which will note times and locations where the draft document can be reviewed and you can add input.

An invitation for community groups to *Compost for our Climate*

Did you know that composting can reduce the impacts of climate change? Composting food and yard waste means: fewer trucks go to the landfill and therefore less carbon dioxide is released in exhaust; less methane is released from the landfill; and finished compost ("black gold") can replace synthetic fertilizers and prevent the greenhouse gases associated with their production and transportation.

For a limited time only, the Greater Victoria Compost Education Centre is pleased to offer subsidized compost bins and composting support to eligible community groups. Community groups can take leadership in addressing climate change and make a difference by starting to compost today!

Join us in our Compost for our Climate and Community program. \$35 includes a composting and climate change workshop, access to subsidized composting supplies, materials for joining the Black Gold Rush Challenge to measure how your composting is having an impact on climate change, and follow-up composting support.



To be eligible, you must be a non-profit, a cooperative, community centre, or community group. Further, your group must be located within the Capital Regional District, have been in existence for at least one year, have a minimum of 5 members, and have demonstrated interest and dedication to continue composting over the long-term.

Ideas Bloom at Broadmead Garden Tour

Not only do Mrs. Hooper's native perennials reduce maintenance time and money, they attract birds and butterflies too. Native plants thrive without pesticides and synthetic fertilizers that can wash down storm drains that lead to salmon in Colquitz Creek. Some residents have already benefited from HAT's land care visits. HAT's field staff meet with landholders to create planting prescriptions specific to their property. Qualified residents will receive free native plants and can choose to host swallow nest boxes built by the 5th Tsartlip Cub Scouts.

Broadmead residents Mary Hooper and Glenn Church hosted a Garden Tour in May as part of HAT's Good Neighbours Project around Rithet's Bog. Over 75 plant species adapted to our dry summer climate, were showcased. Almost fifty people buzzed about the gardens with wish-lists in hand. "Wonderfully organized and presented. Very impressed!" said BARA Bugle contributor Bruce Stewart.

Broadmead resident David Gellately appreciated his land care visit. "HAT's knowledgeable staff gave me a folder of useful landscaping information and some solid recommendations on protecting my Garry oaks. This is exactly what I needed - my interest in native plants has skyrocketed", he said.

Wetland Restoration *at Haliburton Farm*

Visitors and residents living adjacent to the Haliburton Community Organic Farm in Cordova Bay are witnessing the restoration of a wetland within urban Saanich.

The project, carried out by Dr. Purnima Govindarajulu and her University of Victoria Environmental Studies students, aims to restore a vernal (seasonal) pond on the farm. Over time, non-native plants, grazing, and logging have degraded the ecological value of this wetland. It will take years to fully restore the wetland to its full ecological health – and this project is the beginning.

Vernal ponds like those at Haliburton Farm fill with water in the winter and spring, but are dry by late summer. The dramatic fluctuation in water levels provides specialized ecological habitats for many rare plants and animals. These seasonal wetlands are unsuitable habitat for fish, but perfect for many insects and amphibians which can breed and develop with less chance of predation.

The majority of vernal ponds have disappeared from the landscape around Victoria, primarily because people have underestimated their ecological significance. Farmers often view them as non-productive areas because they don't generate income. Urban dwellers may not understand or appreciate the changing views of a vernal pond, and often convert them into permanent ponds with introduced goldfish.

As a first step in reversing this trend, the Haliburton Farm project attempt to restore the vernal wetland on the Farm to its full ecological functioning. The project will begin with collecting baseline data. The next step involves developing a restoration plan, which will have opportunities for farmer collaboration, and opportunities such as harvesting from the wetland. This spring,

nesting boxes were installed and quickly inhabited, and are proving to be a blessing to the farmers as they attract birds that eat insects. For updates on the project, and to volunteer, please visit www.haliburtonfarm.org.
