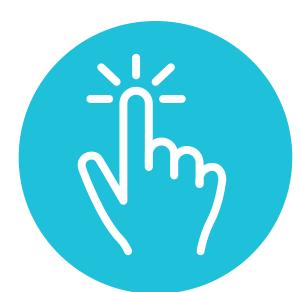
Tree planting and active transportation upgrades promote sustainable travel, reduce car dependence, lower greenhouse gas emissions, and more resilient urban environment.

17 completed development applications expected to deliver 1,751 new dwelling units.

Redevelopment of Nellie McClung Library and Cedar Hill Middle School.

Approval and implementation of the University Heights project, providing additional commercial space and boosting the area's economic potential.

- Determine changes to resolve implementation issues, align with the Official Community Plan, and address priority planning actions from other recently adopted, updated, or ongoing initiatives

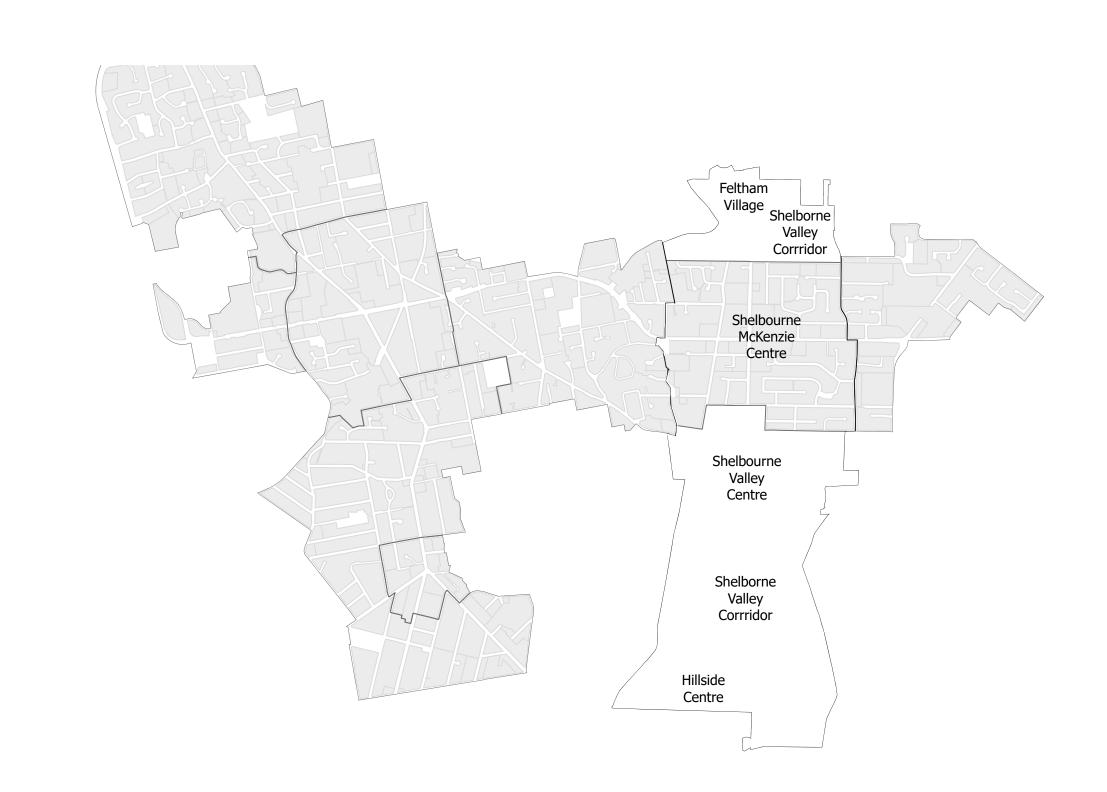
## Out of Scope Initiatives

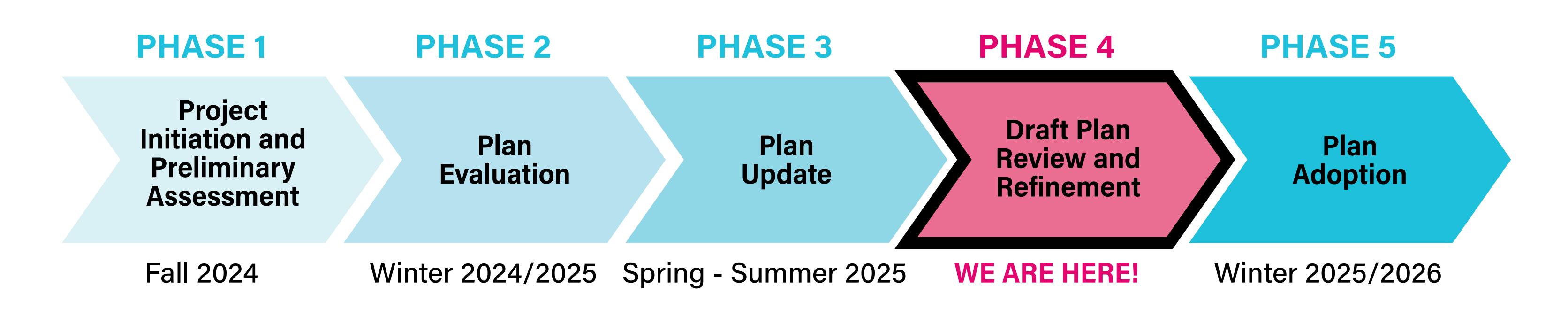

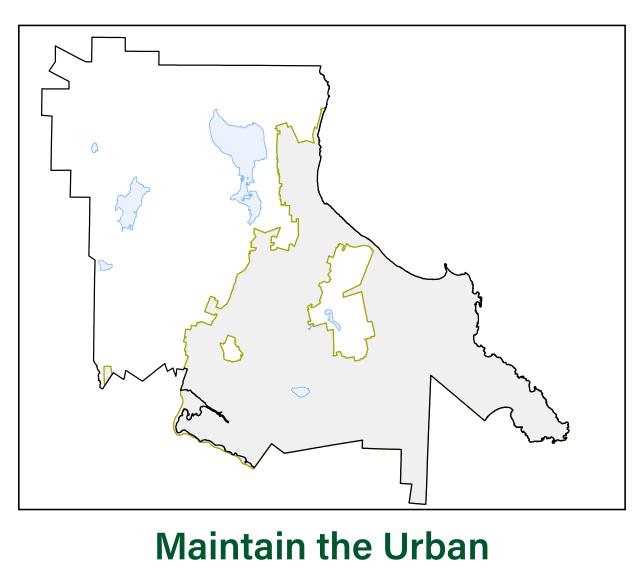
# Why Update the Plan?

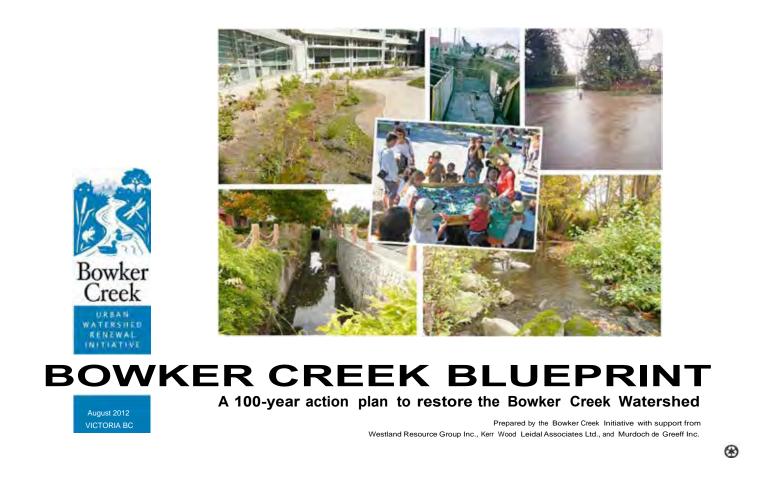












## Reflect changing demographics, market conditions, current and future community needs

- > Saanich is a rapidly growing municipality with 1 in every 10 households in core housing need, 20.8% of which are renters.

## Land Use

- In line with the OCP, new future land use designations have been added for all properties in the planning area.
- Introduced Special Sites: parcels/properties with unique conditions, opportunities, or challenges, and policies to guide redevelopment negotiations.

## Plan Name

•The Plan was renamed as "Shelbourne Valley Plan (SVP)" to better align with the naming convention of other Centre, Corridor and Village Plans (CCVs).

## Climate Change & Environment

• A new climate planning section has been added, as well as biodiversity ranking and tree equity score mapping, with updated directions for managing natural features (like the Bowker Creek), stormwater, and the urban forest in the planning area.

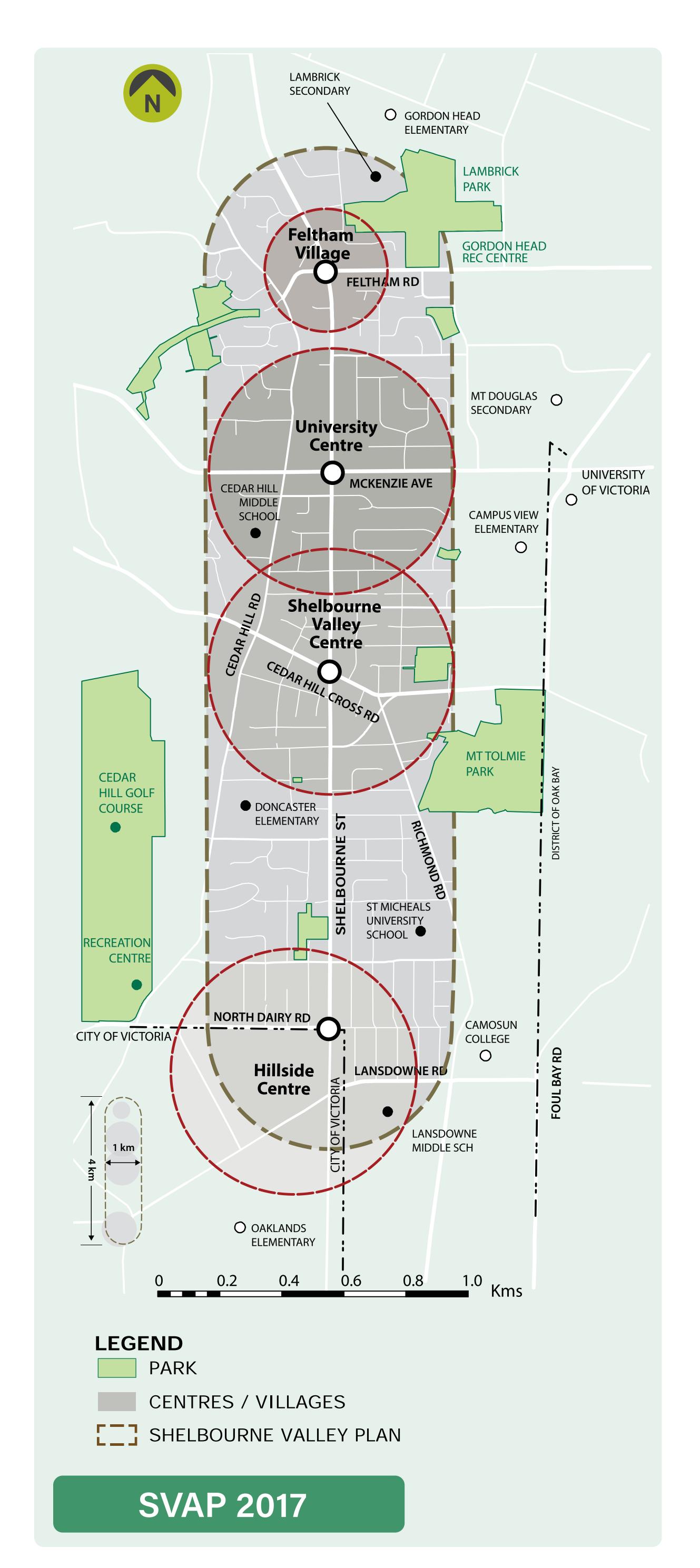

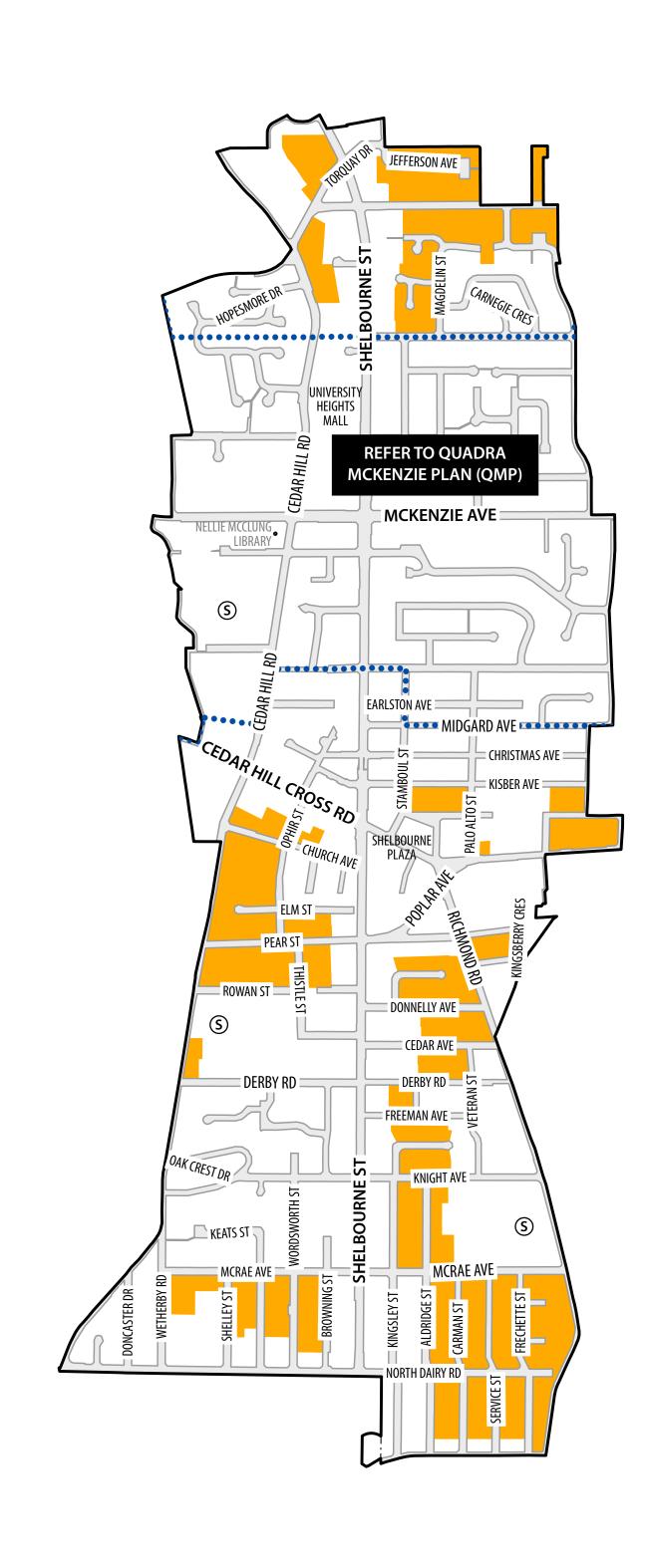


Predominantly multi-unit residential, with limited commercial-retail or live / work units at grade and complemented with park / public spaces.

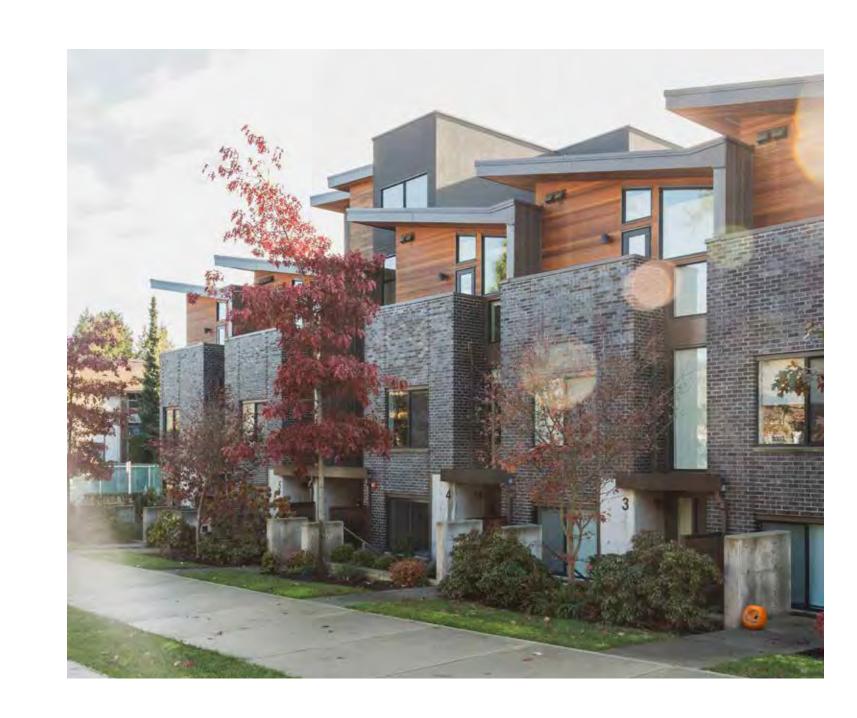

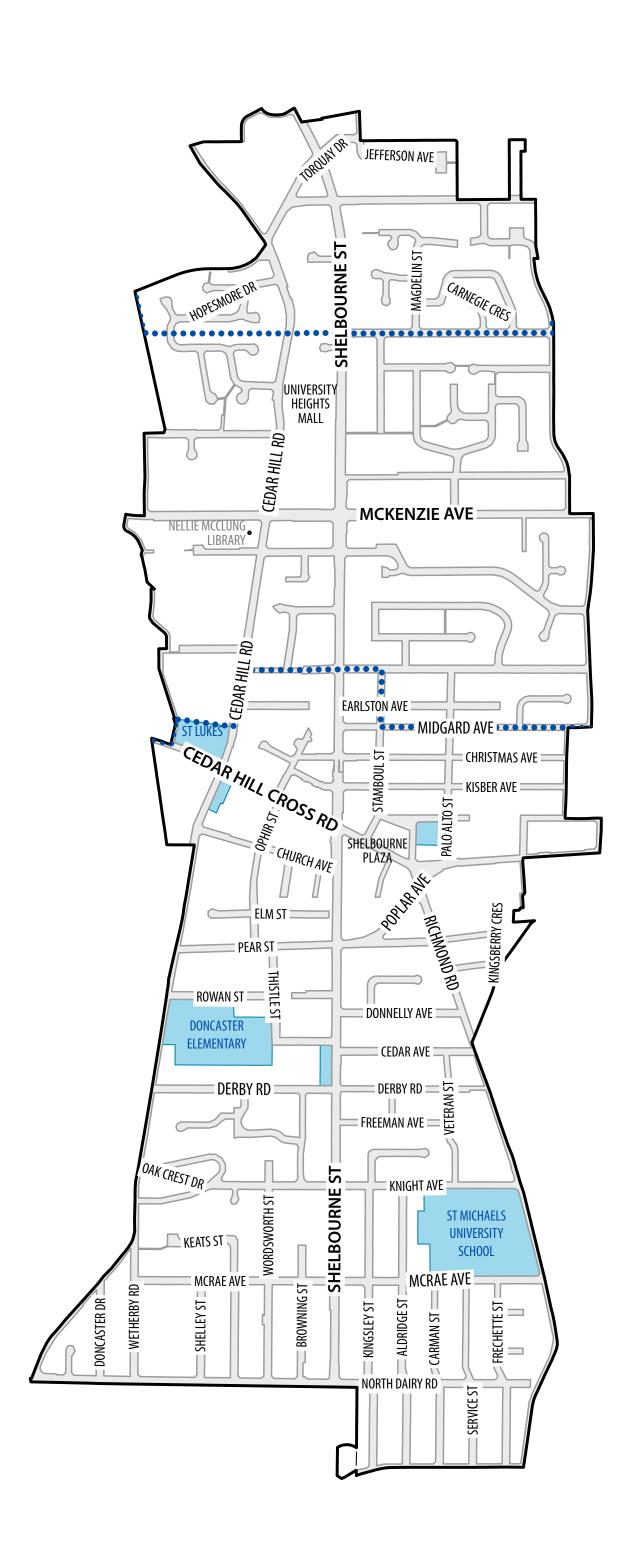

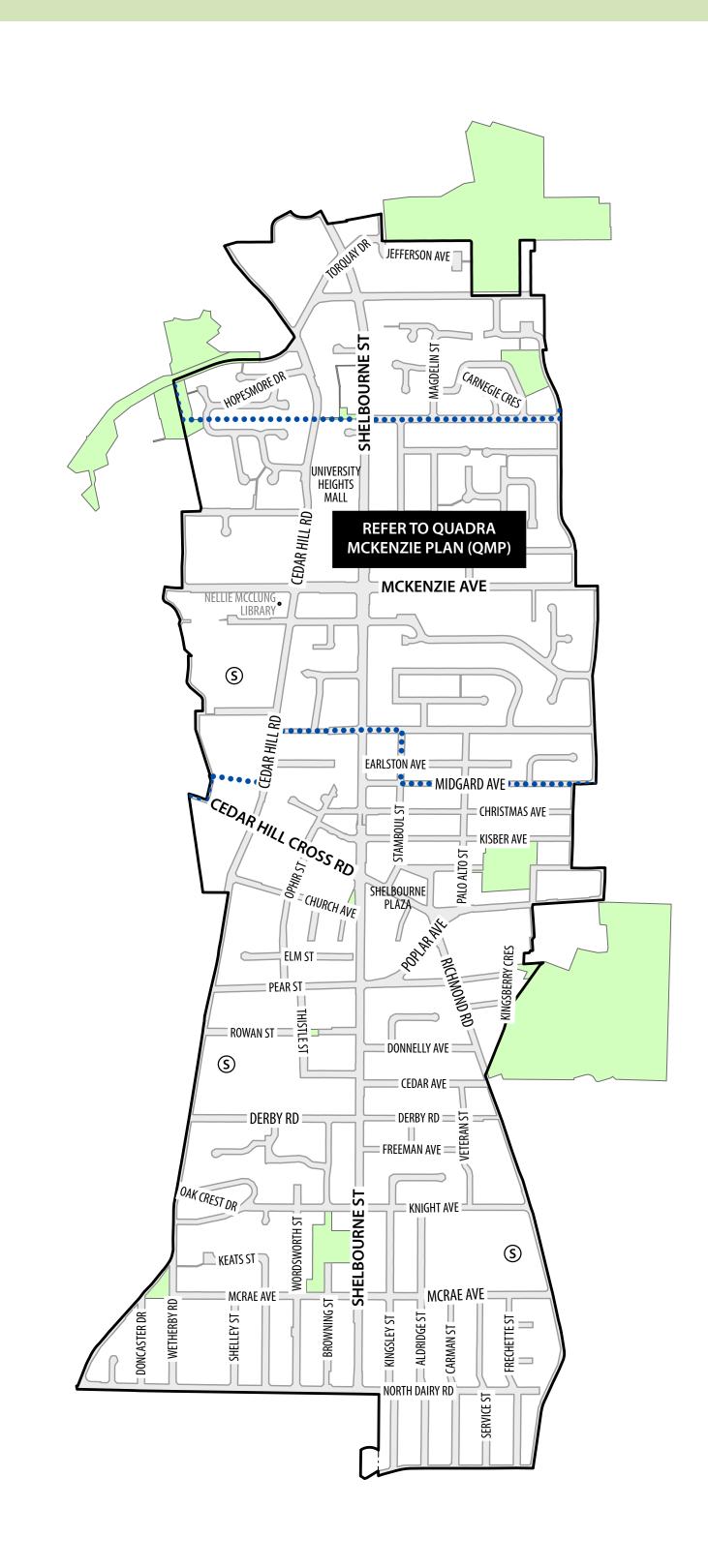

Building heights up to 2.5 storeys.



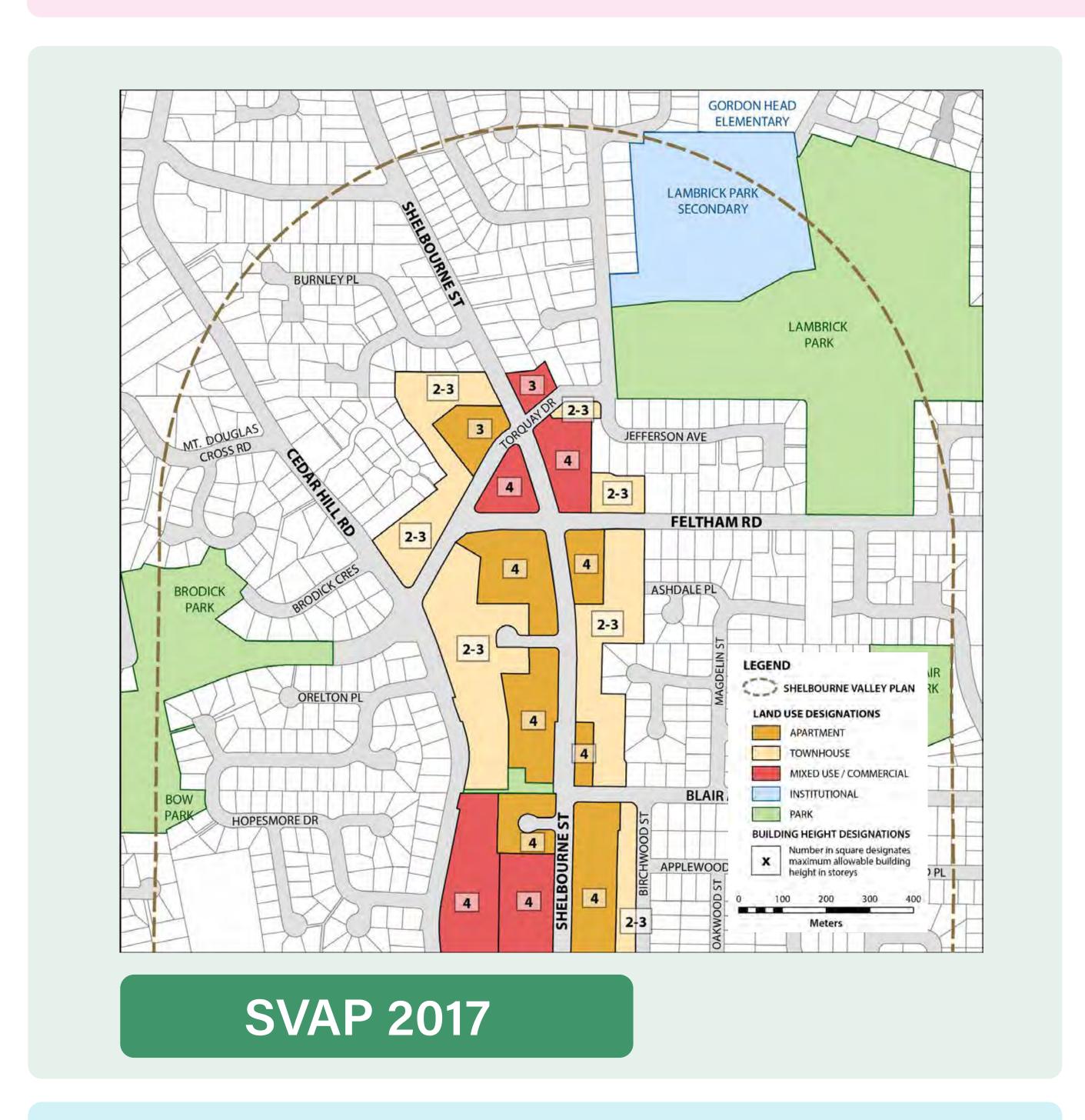


## Feltham Village & Shelbourne Corridor (North)



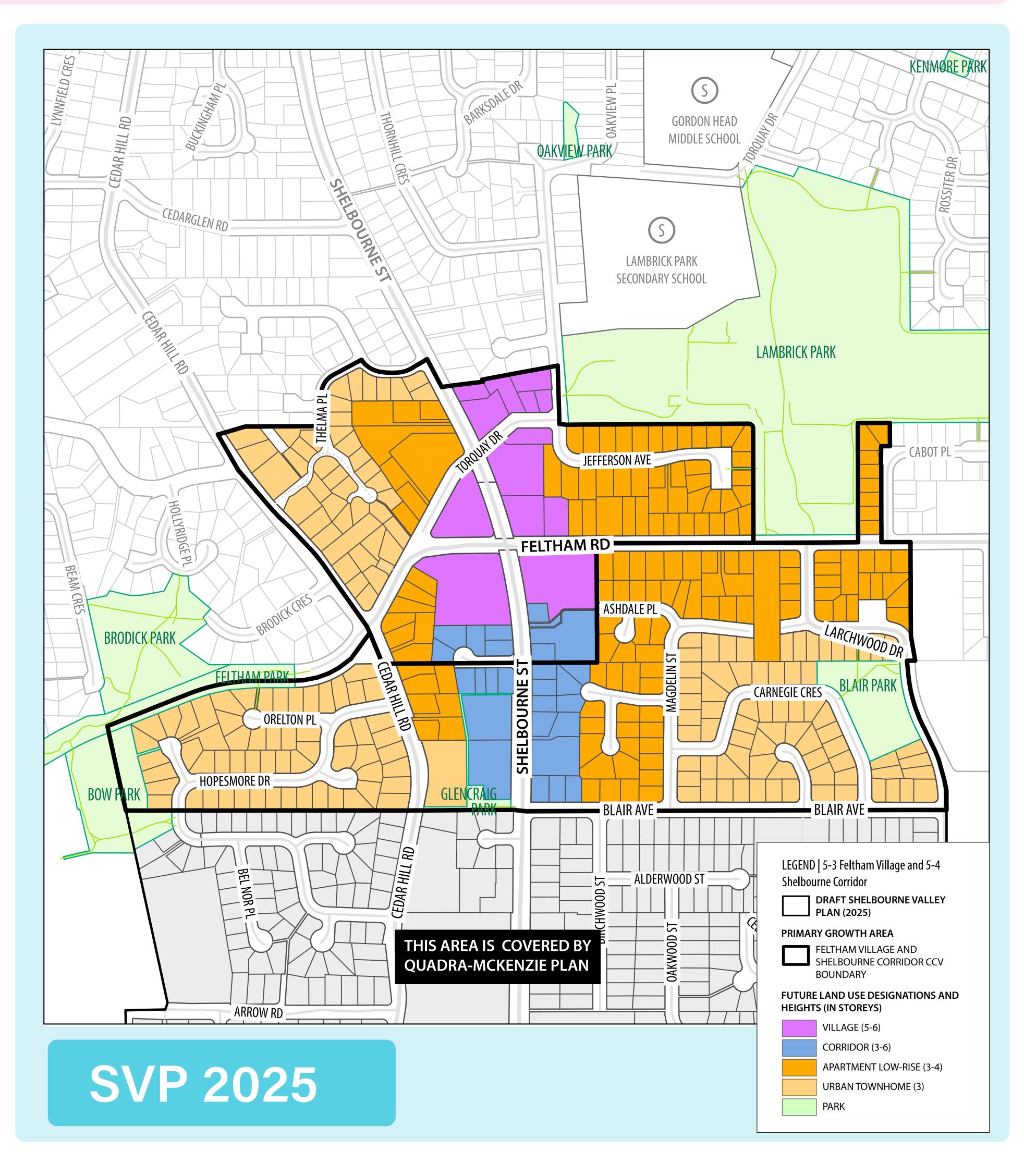
## Overview

Feltham Village is the Valley's northern gateway. It offers limited spaces for local commerce and services at the intersection of Torquay Drive and Shelbourne Street. The Village is envisioned as a vibrant, walkable community with a mix of housing, commercial, institutional, and open spaces.



## Key Changes

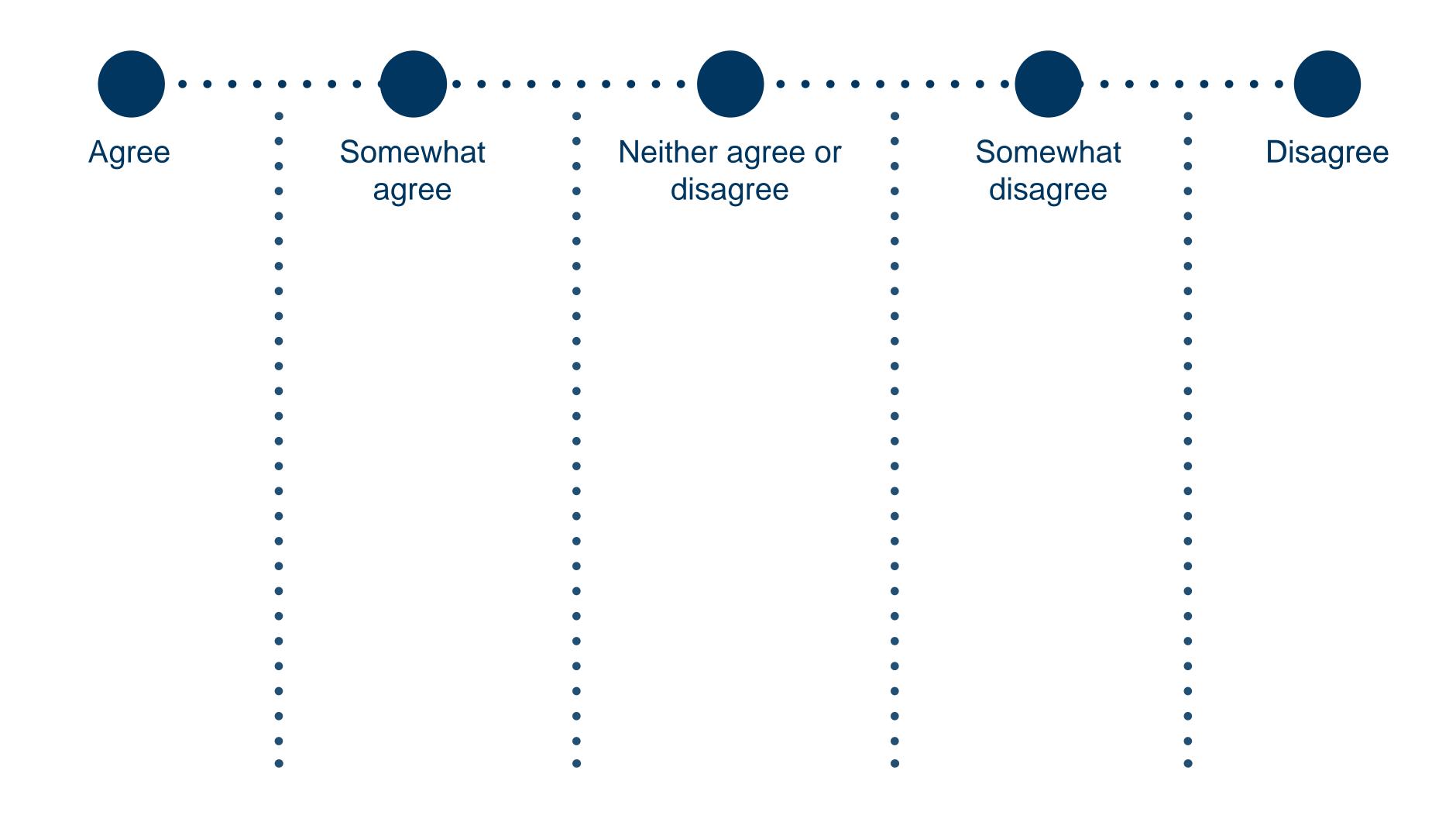
- The Village footprint has been modestly expanded to give opportunities for more commercial spaces and housing, and to improve connections to Lambrick Park and Gordon Head Recreation Centre.
- Corridor designations provide opportunities for new housing near major roads.

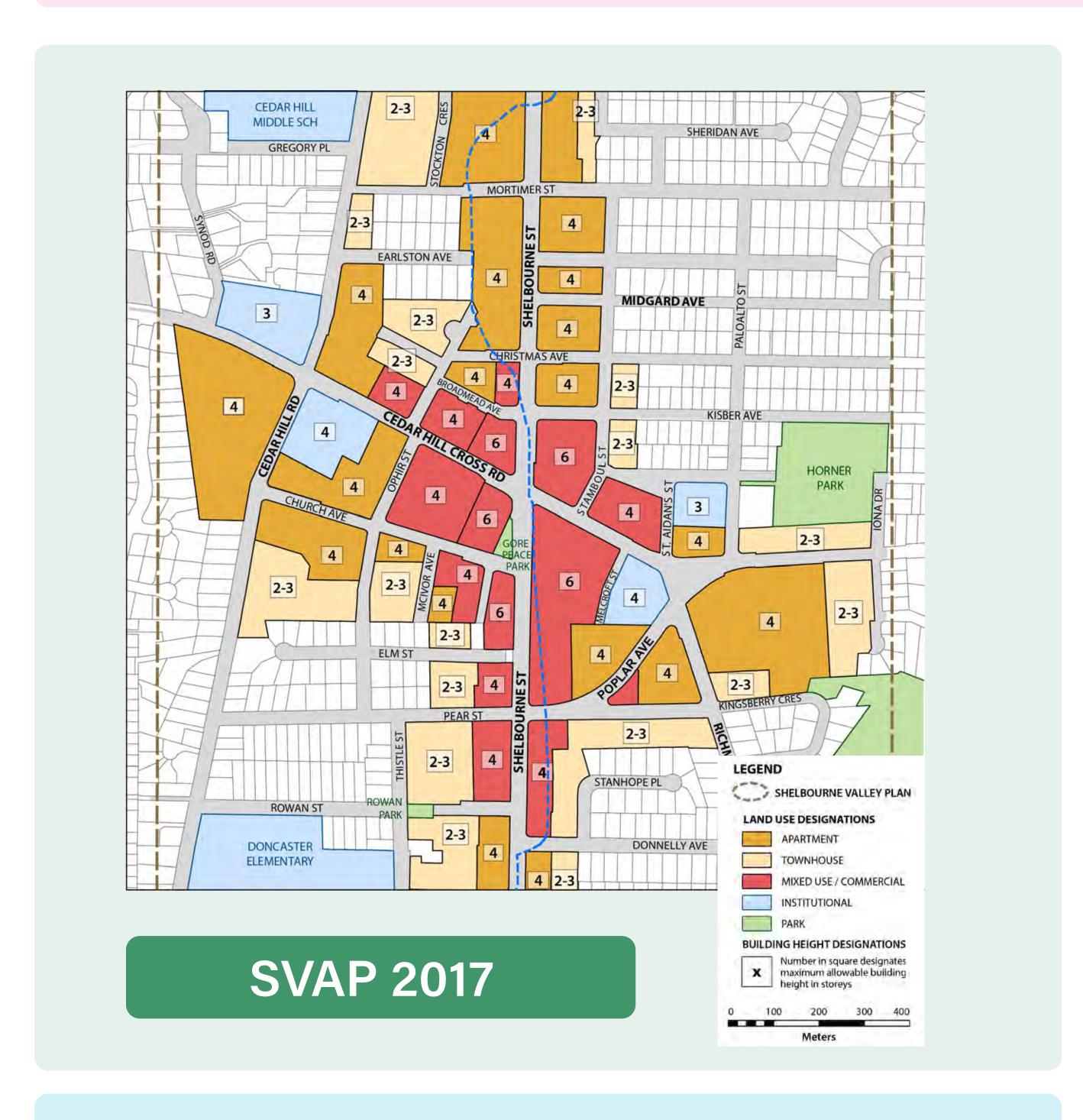
## Shelbourne Valley Centre



## Overview

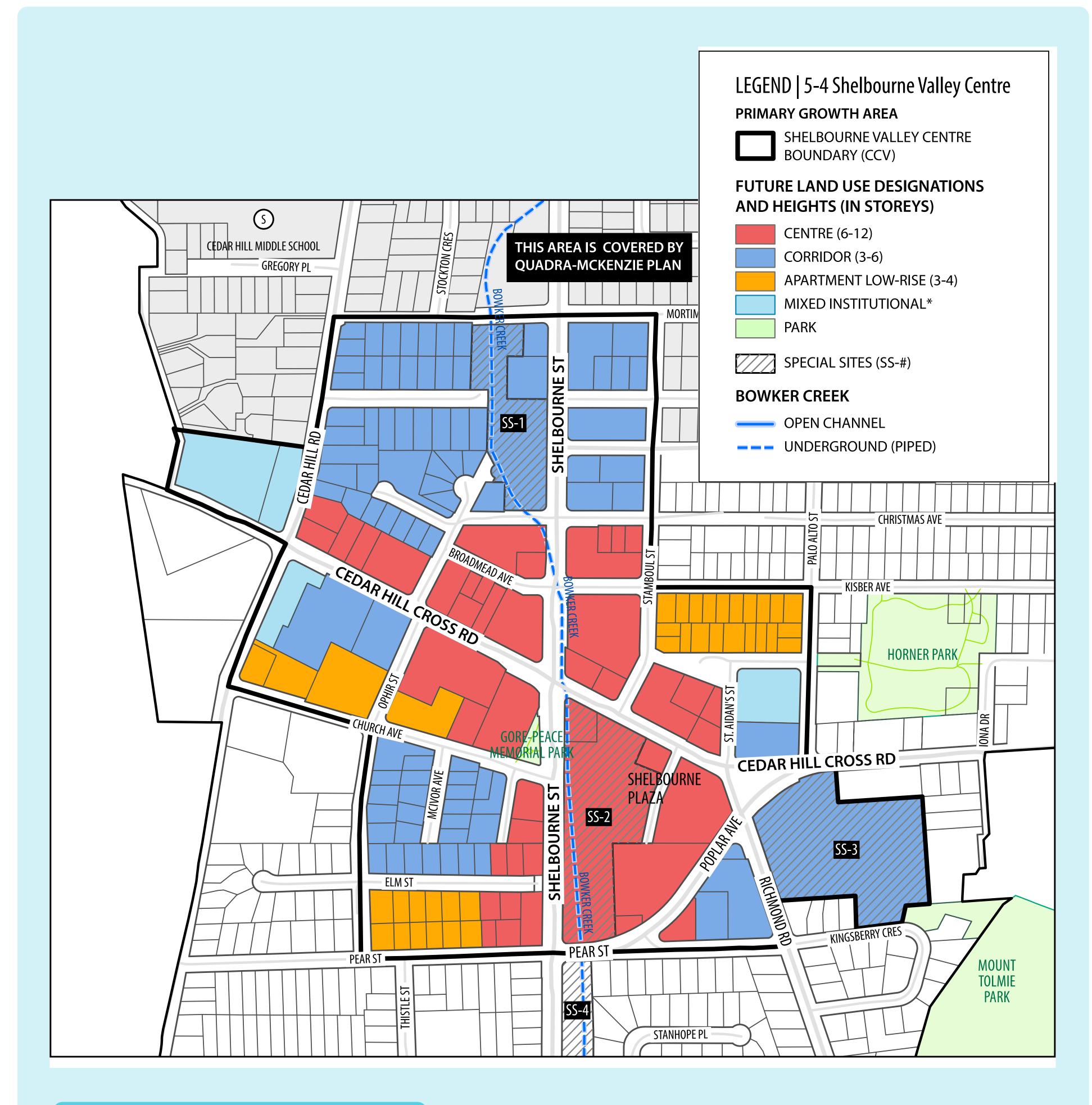

## **Key Changes**

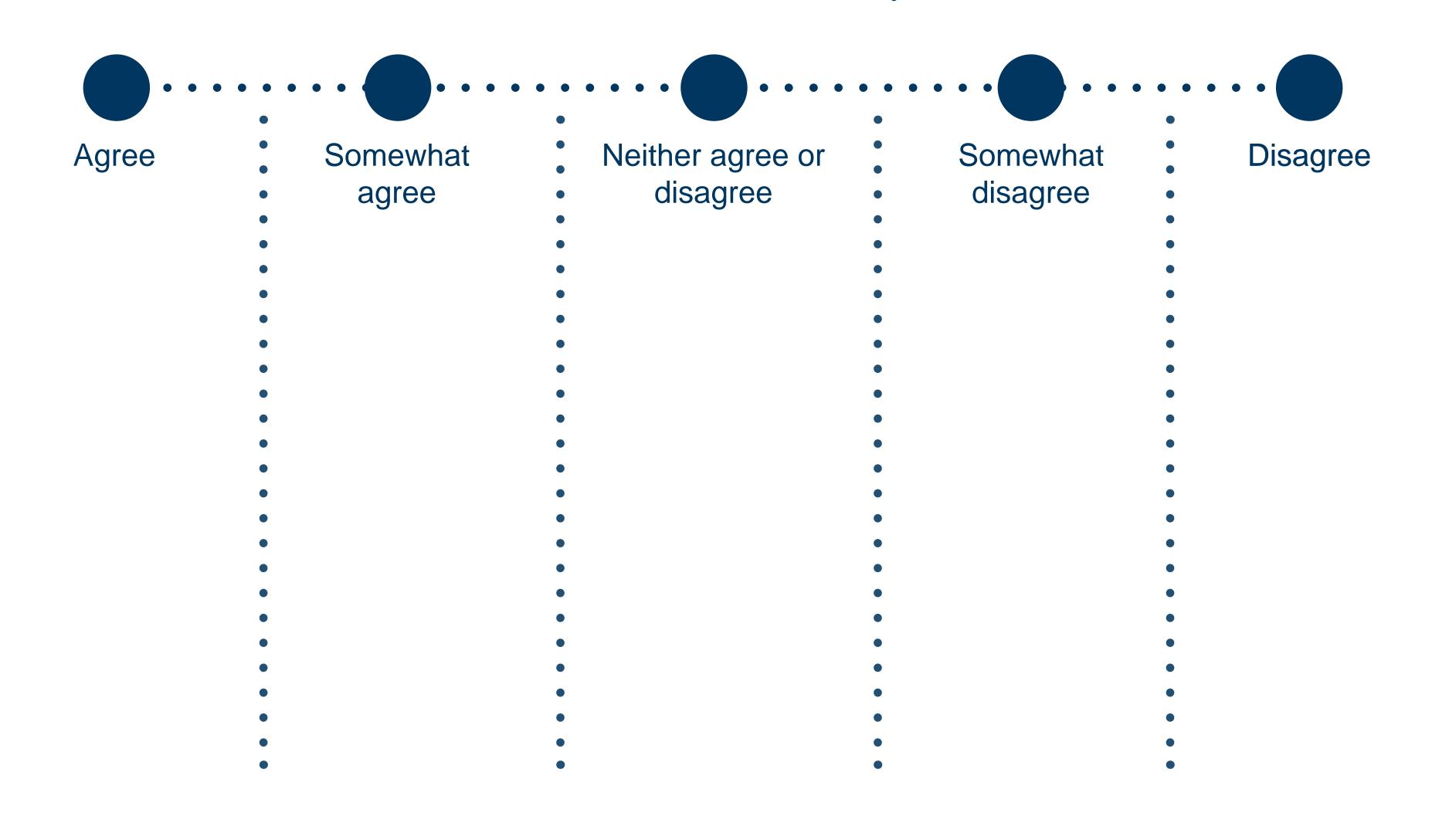
- Three Special-Sites are identified in the centre due to their size and potential to contribute to multiple plan objectives.
- Centre designations have increased in density from 4-6 storeys (2017) to 6-12 storeys (2025) in alignment with the recently adopted OCP.
- Revised area boundary and integration of corridor designations.

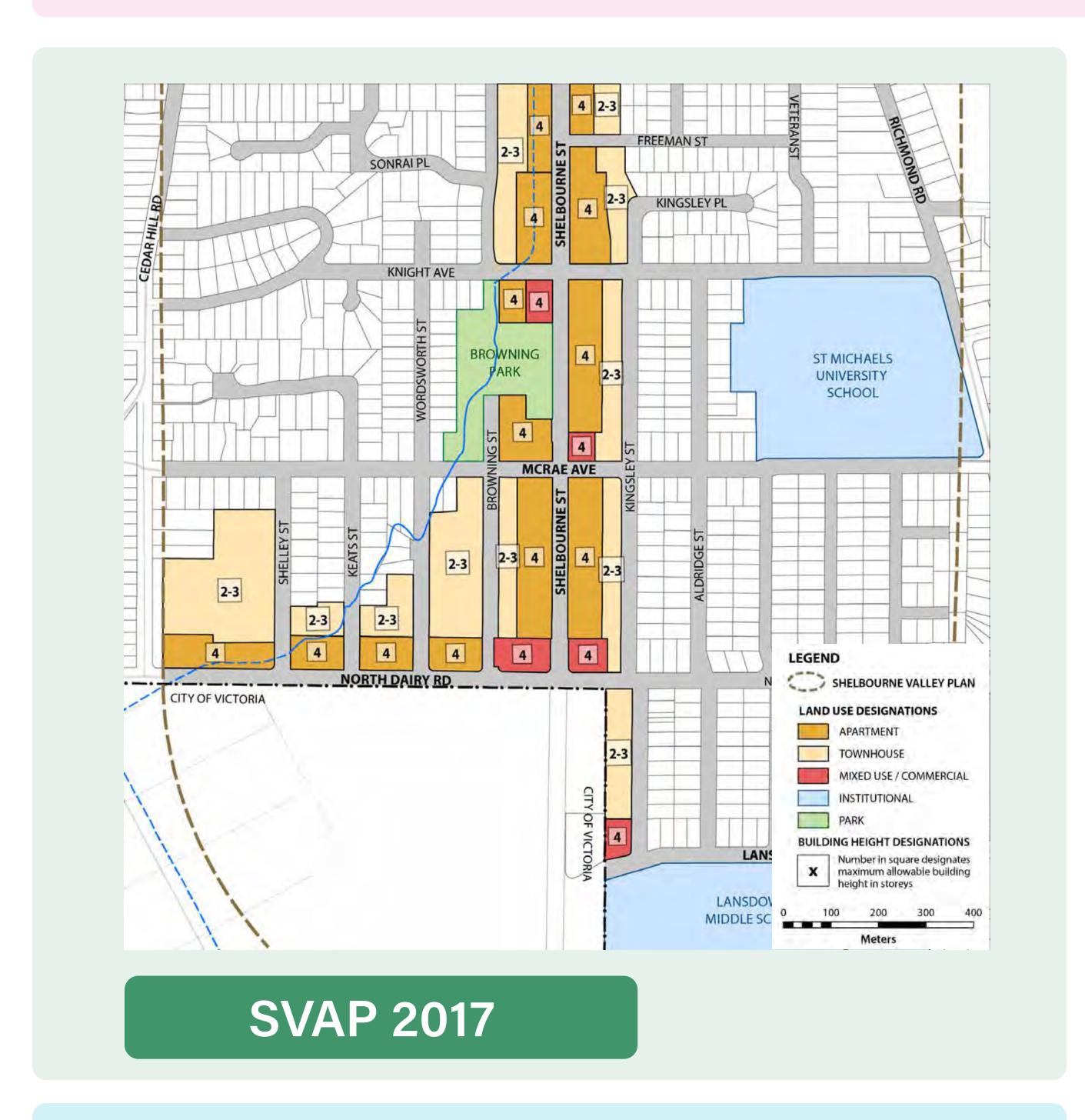


## Hillside Centre & Shelbourne Corridor (South)



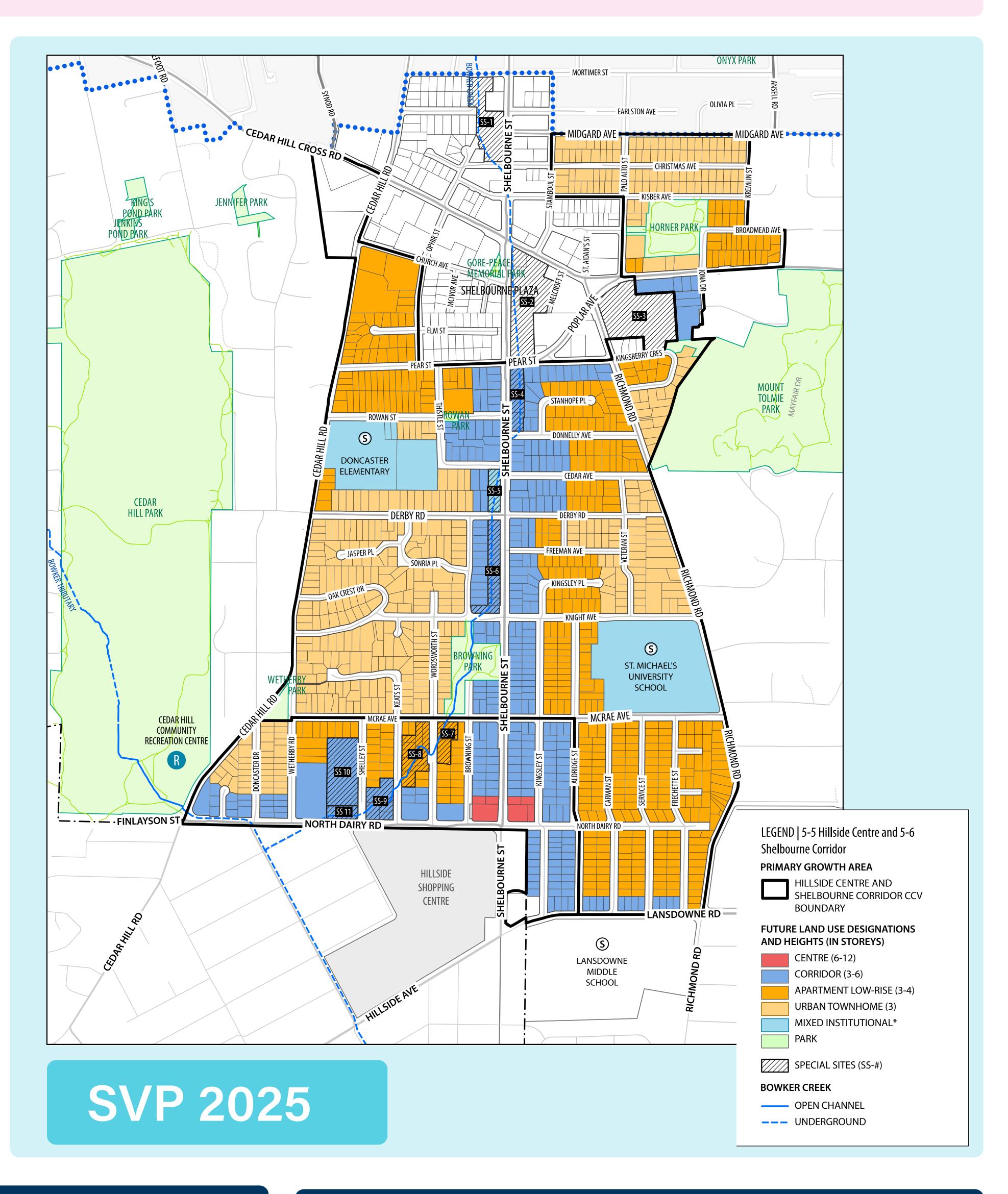
## Overview

Hillside Centre is the southern gateway to the Valley, with major access on North Dairy Road and Shelbourne Street. The area benefits from various commercial and other services in Hillside Town Centre of the City of Victoria; It is the starting point of the Shelbourne Corridor in Saanich which links Centres and Village in the planning area.



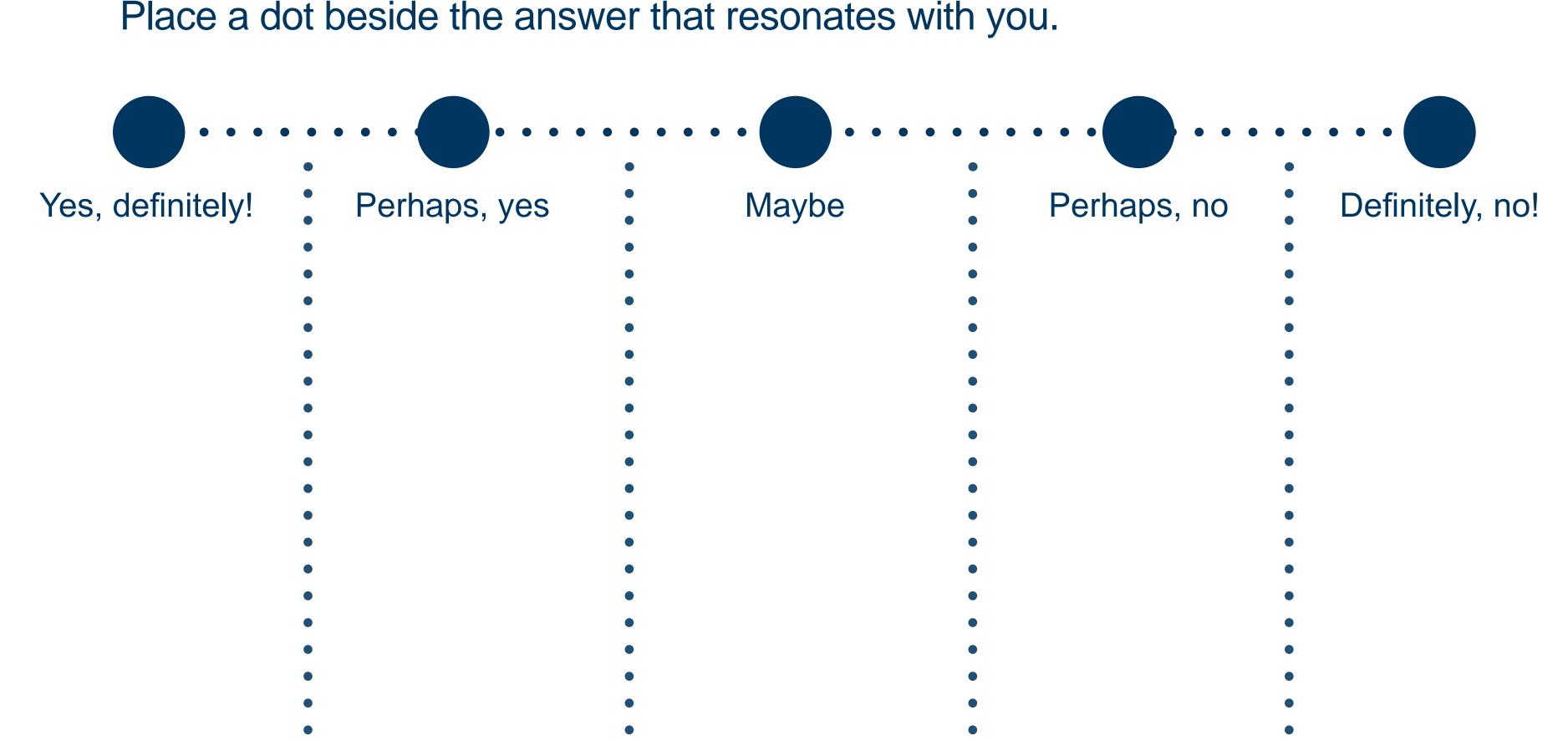
## **Key Changes**

- Hillside Centre was minimally expanded to accommodate more developments near the commerce and service opportunities in and around Hillside Shopping Centre, in City of Victoria.
- Most of the properties that are directly impacted by the Bowker Creek are in this area. These properties (SS-4 to SS-11) have been marked for additional guidance to balance development, creek and riparian zone enhancement (See policies 5.2.12 to 5.2.15, and 5.2.17 in the Draft Updated Plan).

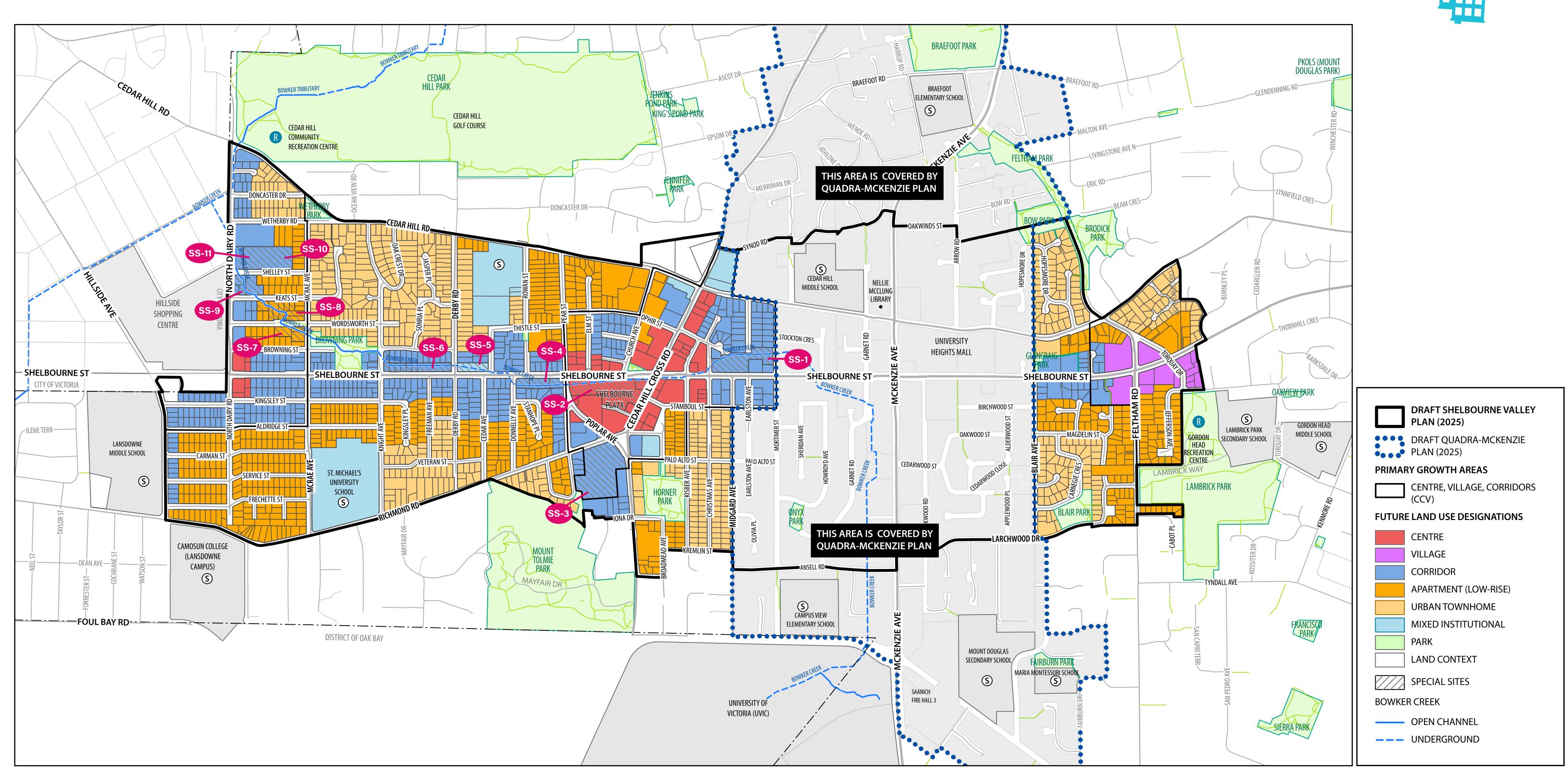

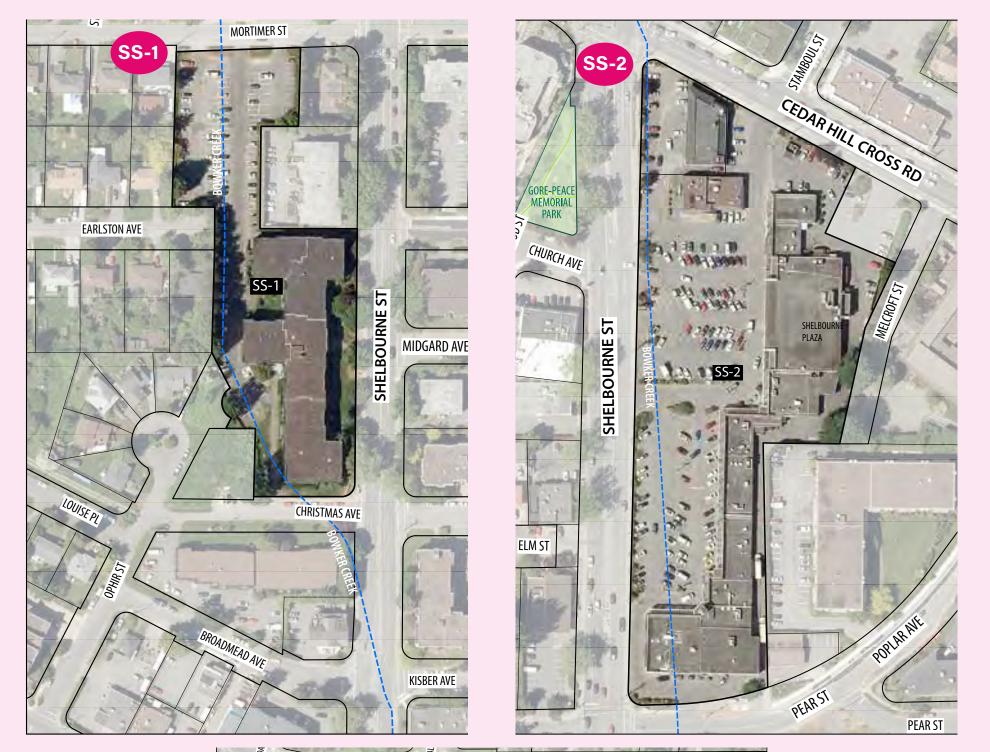
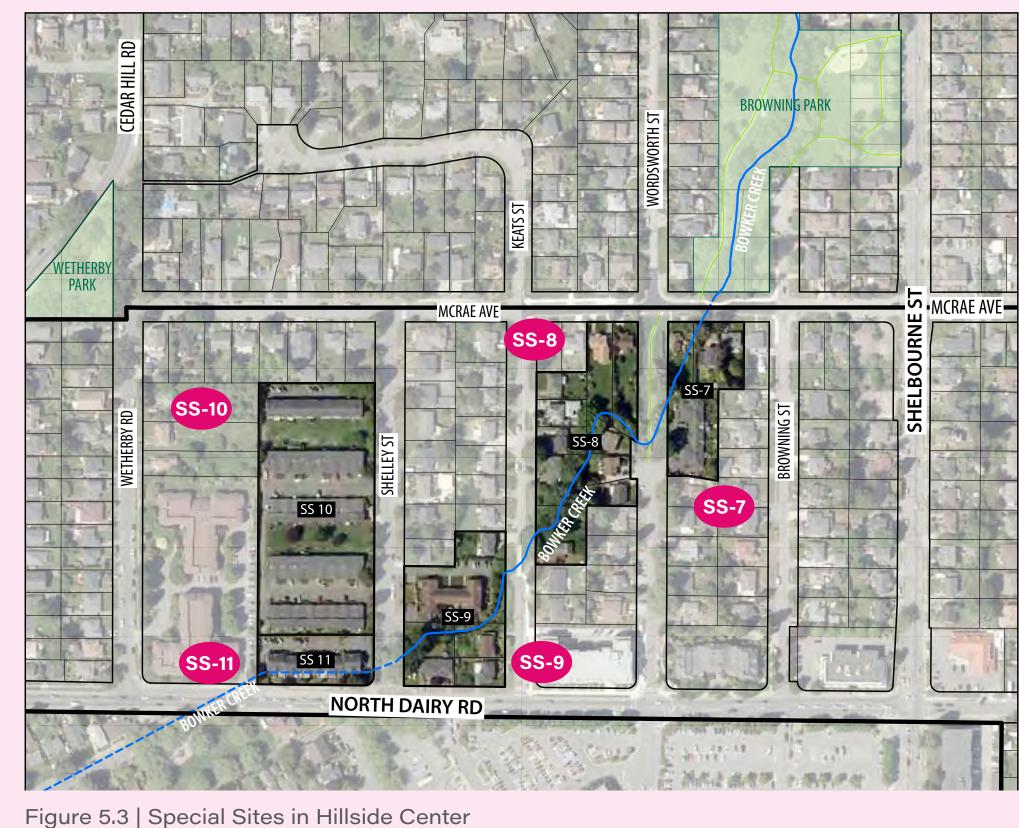




Figure 5.2 | Special Sites in Shelbourne Valley Center SS-1: 3868 Shelbourne Street - Hybury House SS-2: 3667 Shelbourne Street - Shelbourne Plaza SS-3: 1701 Cedar Hill Cross Road -Fraser Tolmie Apartments

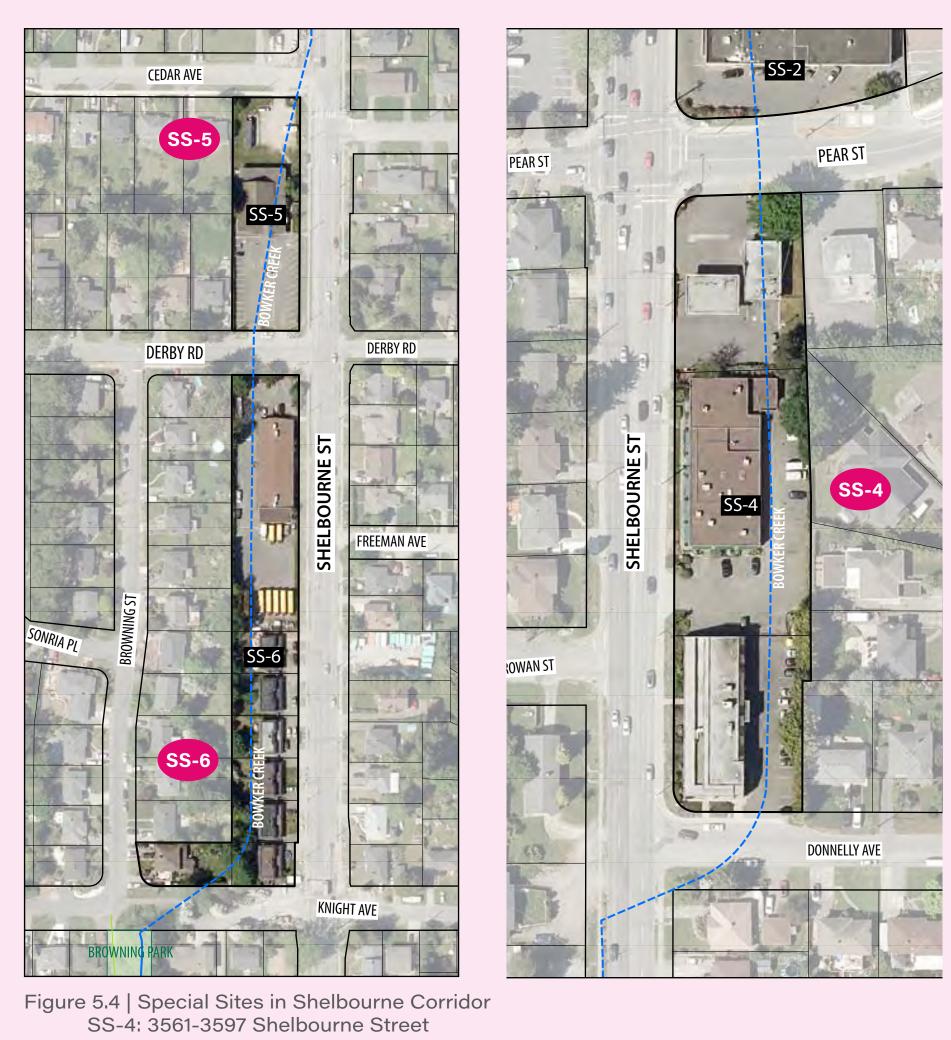

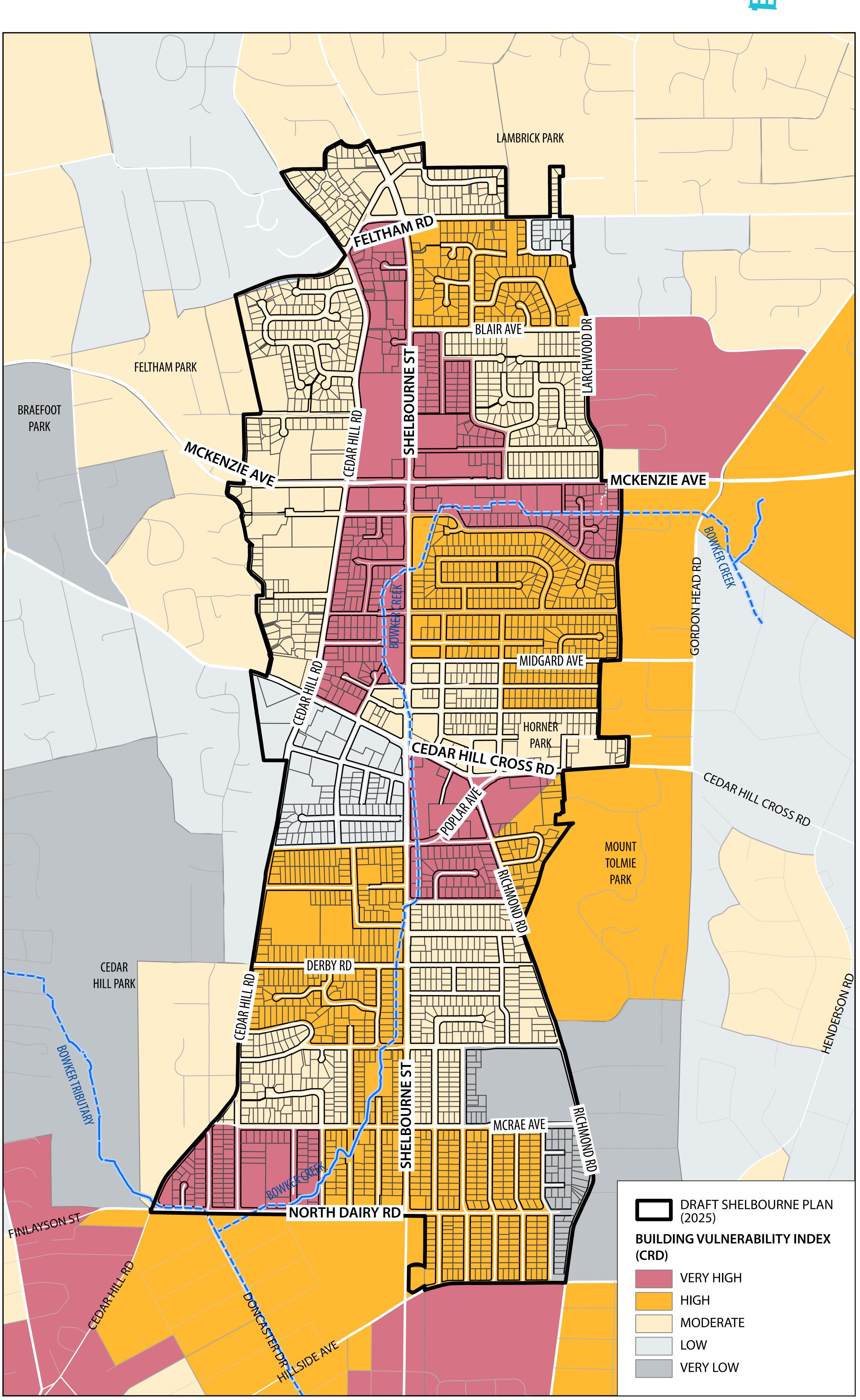
## Climate & Environment: Heat Vulnerability



The 2017 Energy Planning section has been replaced with a new Climate Planning section. It incorporates CRD's extreme heat data, and policies on embodied emissions, zero waste, building energy, and resiliency.

# **Building Vulnerability Index**

- Planning for extreme heat takes into account building age, height, dwelling, type, and solar exposure.
- The Capital Regional District (CRD) combines these variables into a Building Vulnerability Index: a single metric used to evaluate and map relative risk levels across the region.
- This map shows the spatial distribution of susceptibility to extreme heat within the Shelbourne Valley.
- The map highlights areas ranging from very low to very high risk based on vulnerabilities associated with existing building characteristics.



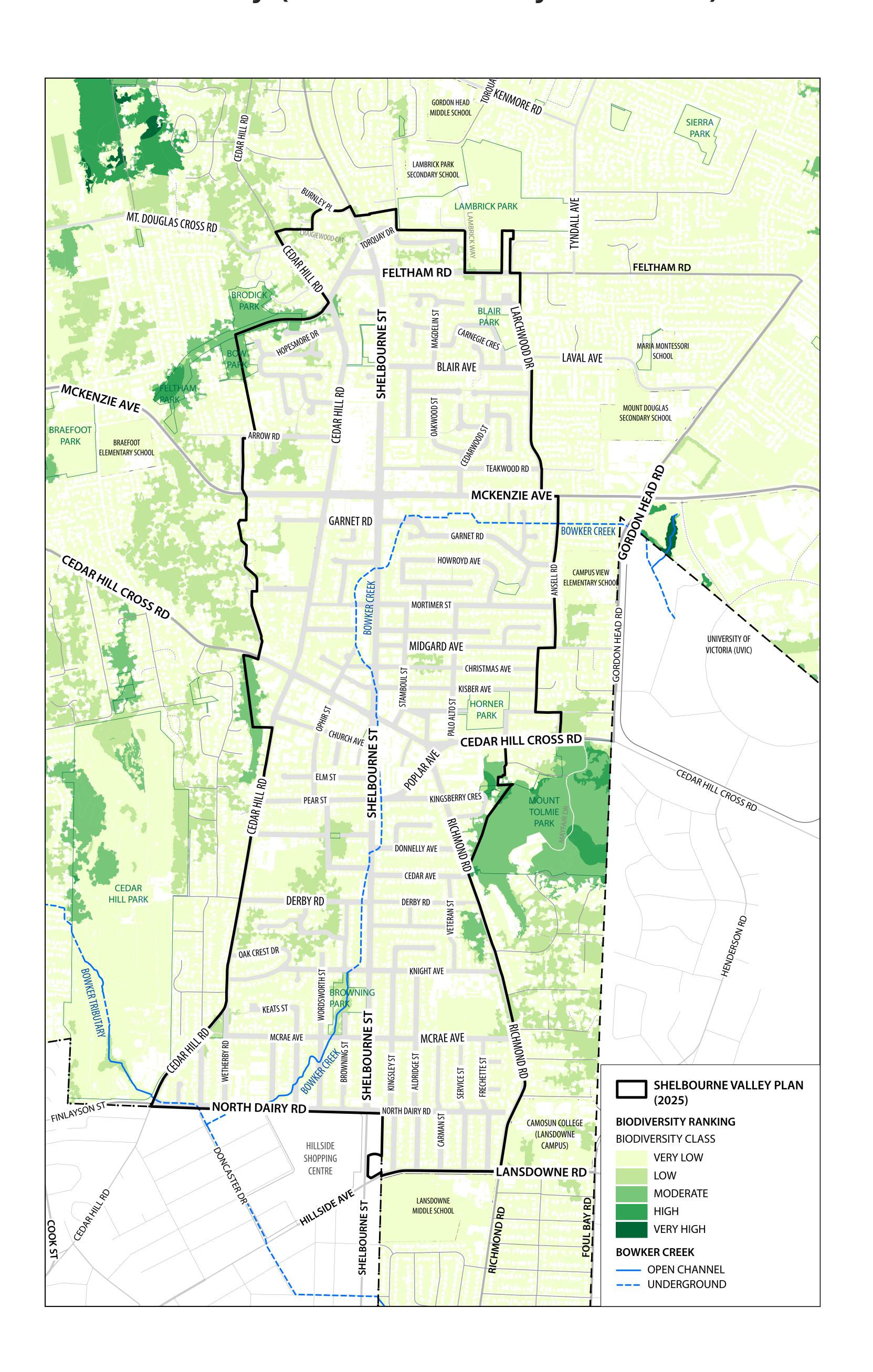

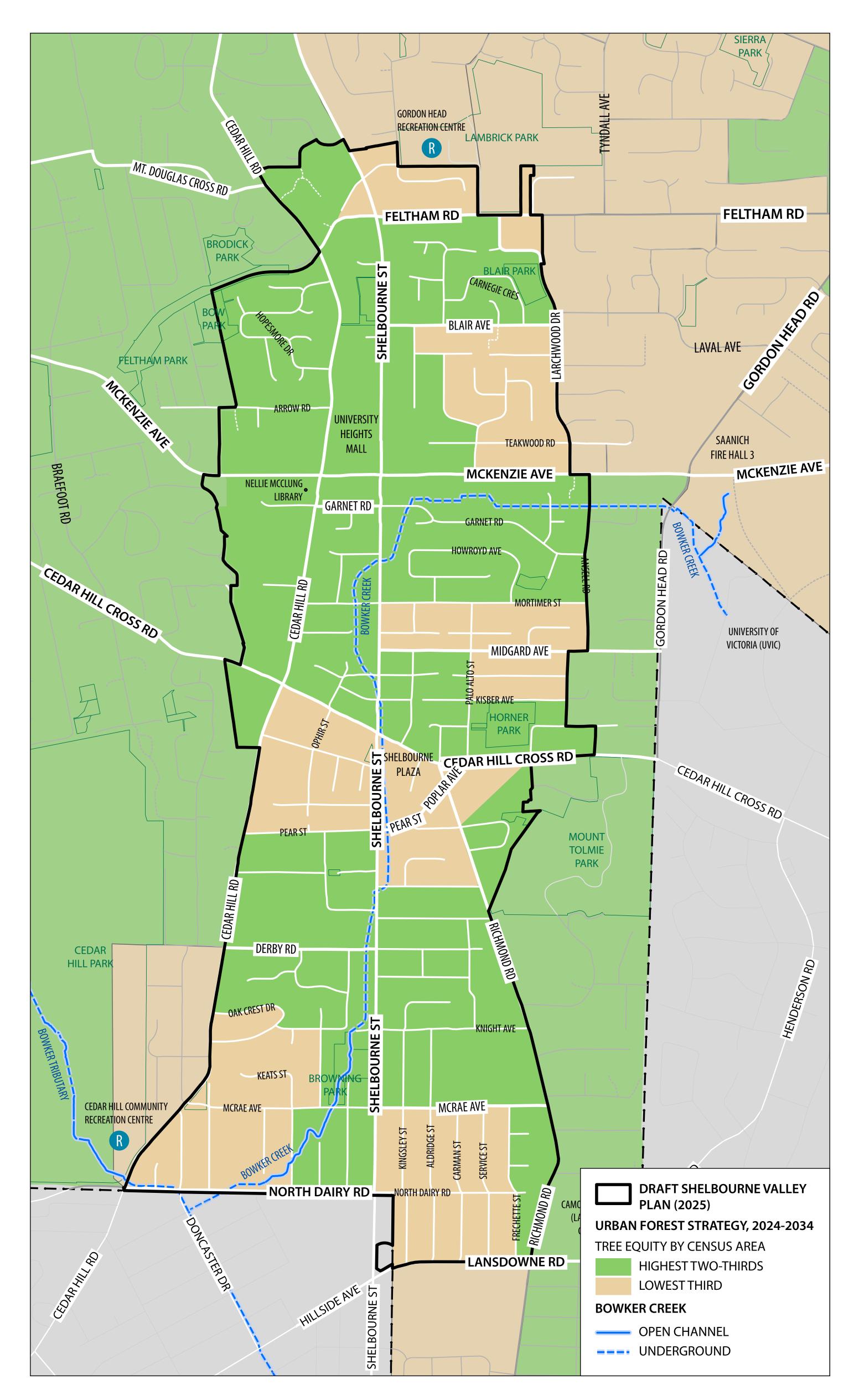
## **Biodiversity Ranking**

- Incorporating Saanich's Biodiversity
  Conservation Strategy, the Biodiversity
  Ranking map in the updated plan shows areas
  within the Shelbourne Valley, ranked from very
  low to very high biodiversity value.
- The map helps identify where habitat is most valuable for plants, animals, and ecological processes (high to very high areas) and where restoration could improve ecological connectivity (moderate to very low areas).



## **Tree Equity Scores**

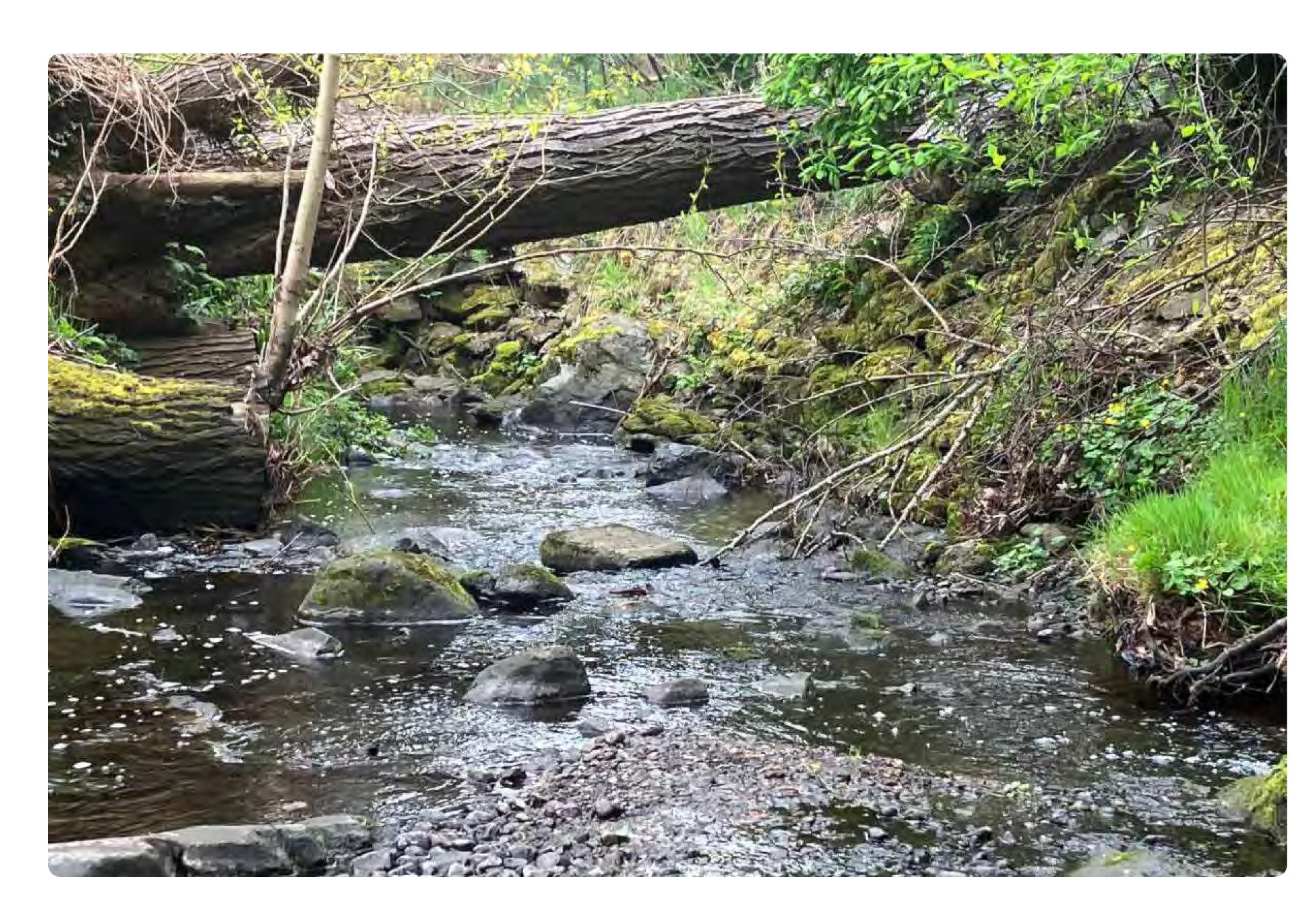
- The updated plan incorporated the Saanich's Urban Forest Strategy which sets a longterm goal of 20% canopy cover in the Primary Growth Areas to enhance urban tree distribution and access.
- Tree equity score mapping in the Shelbourne Valley shows the distributional inequity of urban tree canopy in comparison to where the population stands to benefit most, helping guide policies to extend urban forest to underserved areas.





## Climate & Environment: Bowker Creek





## **Bowker Creek**

- Bowker Creek is an important natural feature in the Shelbourne Valley that was considered in the updated Plan.
- Beyond revising several policies to promote and explore opportunities for daylighting the creek, two new policies were added to support the restoration and enhancement of natural areas within the riparian zone and foster community involvement, consistent with the updated Blueprint.
- Sites directly affected by the Creek were also identified, with site-specific policies introduced to support the creek ecosystem.

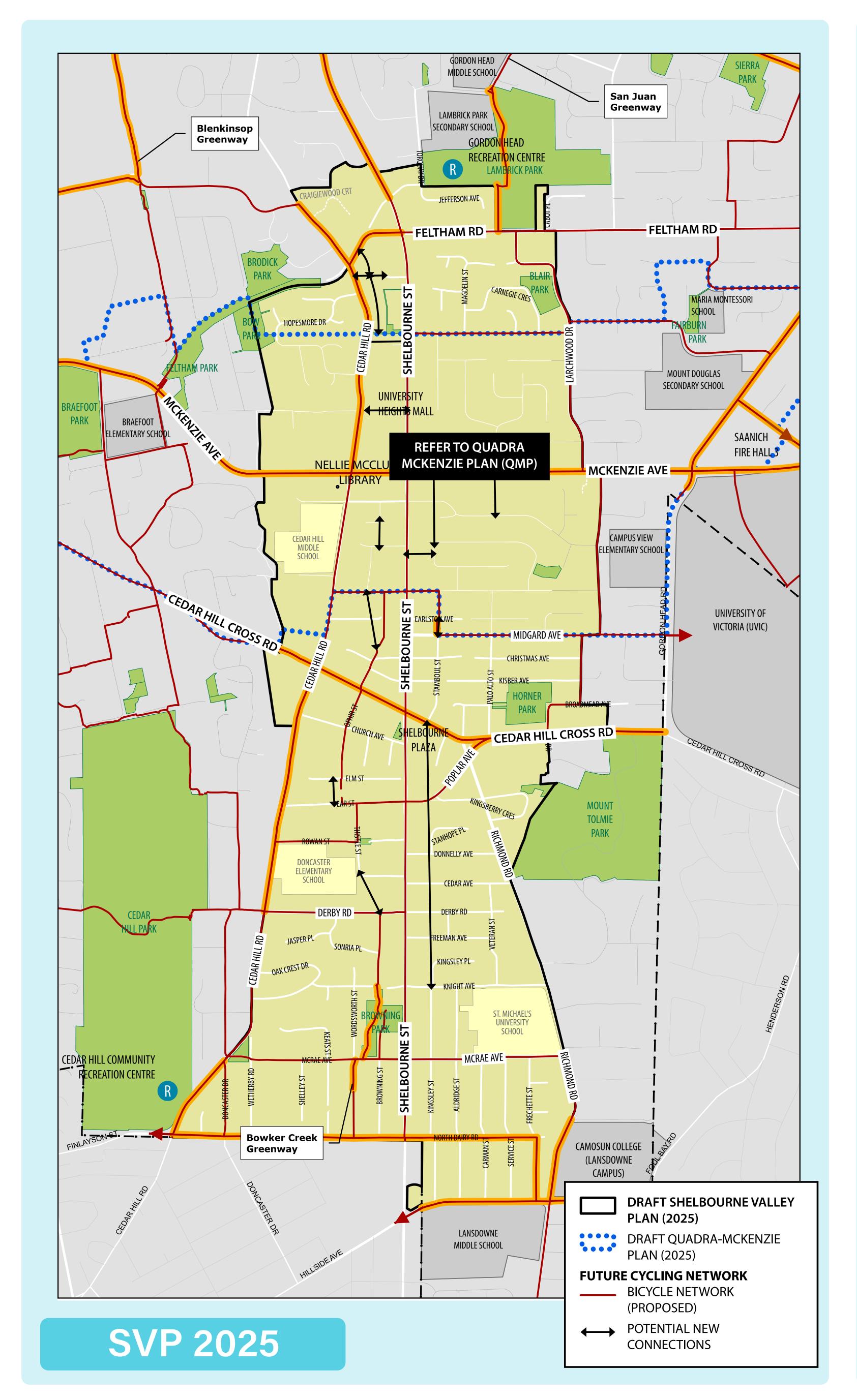

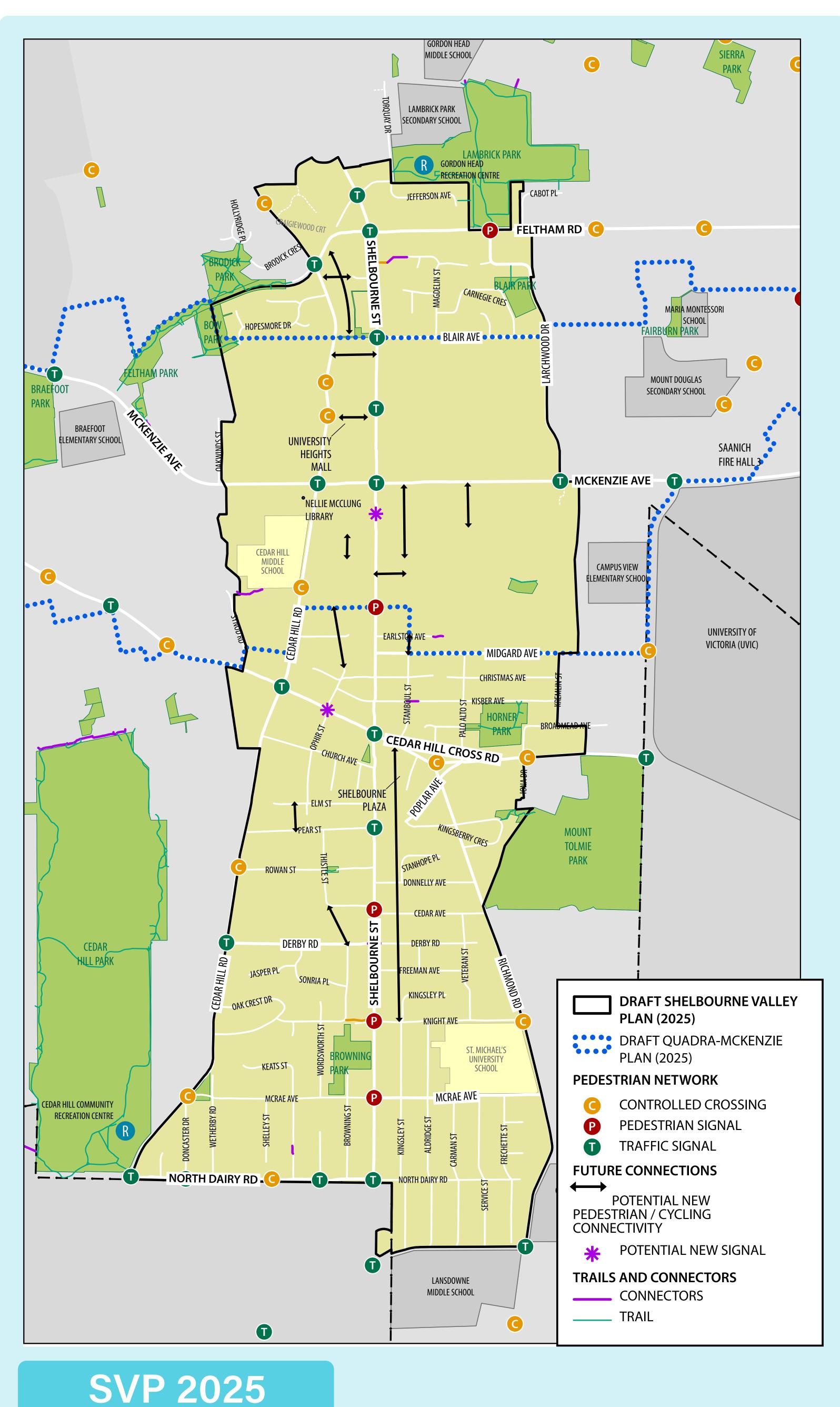
