On January 7, 2009, an 8 page survey was mailed to 1,500 randomly selected Saanich residents, asking them to share their ideas and opinions about Saanich as a community, and the District of Saanich as their municipal government. Respondents had the choice of filling out a paper copy of the survey, or completing an electronic copy online. By the January 27, 2009 response deadline, 489 completed surveys had been received, providing a good response rate of 33%, and a low sampling error of $\pm 4\%$, 19 times out of 20.

The main body of this report contains a brief narrative analysis of each significant section of the survey, followed by selected figures and tables showing the most relevant or interesting segments of the available data. For all sections of the survey, more complete figures, including results broken down into demographic sub-groups such as age or area, are available in Appendix III. The actual wording and presentation of questions used in the original survey can be found in Appendix V.

The most significant results from each section of this report are briefly summarized here:

Quality of Life

- Over 95% of respondents describe the quality of life in Saanich as good or very good, up from 93% in 2006 and 87% in 2003.
- The aspects of Saanich that are most enjoyed by residents include the central location, the quiet and friendly neighbourhoods and the extensive system of parks and trails in the district.
- The most commonly noted dislikes involved transportation issues such as traffic congestion in specific areas and a lack of sidewalks in some Saanich neighbourhoods.
- > 84% of survey participants reported feeling safe or very safe in their neighbourhoods

Service Delivery

- Municipal garbage collection received the highest satisfaction rating of all municipal services offered followed by fire fighting, residential recycling and the quality of drinking water. The services highlighted as most important are the quality of drinking water, fire fighting and police services.
- Residents reported that the municipal services they used most as visiting a Saanich park or nature trail, using the Galloping Goose or Lochside Trail, using Saanich recreation centres and visiting public libraries.

Local Government

- 67% of participants reported they agree or strongly agree that the District of Saanich government is doing a good job.
- Results indicate that survey participants feel revenue sources should come firstly from government grants, then from user fees, reserves or savings, property taxes and lastly from borrowing.
- 63% of survey respondents want Saanich Council to maintain the current levels of property taxation while offering the same or reduced levels of municipal services.
- Residents ranked the three highest capital project priorities as roads and traffic control, the sanitary sewer and storm drainage systems and the water system.

Near the end of 2002, the District of Saanich embarked on a process to renew its strategic direction. The Mayor, Council and staff recognized the importance of citizen and business input to this process. The first Saanich Citizen Survey was completed in 2003 and the results of a second survey were published in 2006.

This third citizen's survey follows the same methodology as the previous two. Readers are encouraged to read all surveys for their own interest; however caution should be exercised when comparing the results of the 2003 and 2006 Citizen Survey with the current survey results. The differences among these three studies have not been statistically tested to determine whether they are significant. A comparative analysis to provide trend data is planned in **June, 2009**.

Survey Objectives

- 1. Obtain a statistical assessment of citizen perceptions of service delivery availability and quality.
- 2. Provide citizen input to financial planning.
- 3. Gather citizen feedback on public involvement processes.
- 4. Provide citizen input to the district's annual strategic planning process.
- 5. Obtain comparative statistics for the district's annual progress reporting process.

Methodology

The eight-page 2009 Citizen Survey was mailed to 1,500 randomly selected Saanich residences on January 7, 2009. Of those surveys mailed out, 38 were returned as undeliverable giving a total of 1,462 valid survey recipients. Responses were due by January 27, at which time 489 completed surveys had been returned, translating to a 33.4% response rate.

Based on a sample size of 489, the sampling error (also called "margin of error") is plus or minus 4.3%, 19 times out of 20, which means that 95% of the time, our survey results will vary $\pm 4.3\%$ from the results obtained if every citizen in the District of Saanich were surveyed. Subgroups like age groups, place of residence or gender can be analyzed, although because they contain fewer respondents than the total, the size of the sampling error may increase.

Although responses to many of the evaluative questions were made on a 5 point scale with 5 representing the best rating and 1 the worst, most of the results in this summary are reported on a common scale where 0 is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating.

<u>No</u> statistical reweighing of results was done to precisely match the demographic characteristics of survey respondents with those of the population. Demographic differences between the sample and the population were judged to be not significant enough to warrant the additional time and expense required for statistical reweighing. In almost all questions, results are provided for each demographic group, allowing survey readers to make their own judgements on the differences present between sub-groups.

The sample is underrepresented by respondents under the age of 44, and by respondents who are renters. Please see Appendix I for demographic data.

Presentation of Results

The main body of this report contains a brief narrative analysis of each section of the survey, followed by selected figures and tables showing the most relevant or interesting segments of the available data. For all sections of the survey, more complete figures, including results broken down by demographic data, are available in Appendix III. The actual wording and presentation of questions used in the original survey can be found in Appendix V.

Brief survey results are presented in this part of the report. Each section begins with an explanation of the components included and a summary of the findings is included for each figure or table within the following sections:

- Quality of Life
- Service Delivery
- Local Government

Quality of Life

Measuring quality of life is complex, and involves many different indicators. The three groupings of results presented below – "a place to live", "safety and security" and "likes and dislikes" – provide a reasonable indication of the perceived quality of life in Saanich.

The responses to these three groupings of questions suggest a very positive perception of quality of life in Saanich. Residents are happy living here, generally feel safe, appreciate the amenities, environment and location, and plan to stay. When asked what they dislike most about Saanich, a significant percentage of residents cite traffic and transportation – a theme that runs throughout the survey. Clearly this issue is one which residents feel strongly about as a problem and its impact on quality of life.

A Place to Live (Question #1)

When asked their perceptions of quality of life in Saanich, survey respondents were very positive about Saanich as a community in which to live. These questions received some of the most positive ratings in the survey (see App. III for all data). Residents assigned an average rating of 87% to the quality of life in Saanich. Quality of life ratings improved from 2003 in 2006 and remain consistently high in 2009. The average scores for 2009 are shown in Figure 1 below.

Safety & Security (Question #4)

Perceptions of safety and security remain consistent with 2006 results. Safety in Saanich neighbourhoods received a high score (average of 79), with only 3% indicating they felt unsafe or very unsafe. Not surprisingly, safety when using Saanich roadways received a lower average rating which is consistent with 2006. The perception that safety is improving was somewhat lower with an average score of 63 out of 100.

Likes & Dislikes (Question #2 & #3)

Survey respondents were asked to list up to three things that they liked most about Saanich, and three things they dislike the most. Their responses were categorized into similar groupings or themes and are reported in aggregate form. Verbatim responses are available in Appendix IV.

The survey results indicate that residents continue to place a high value on the municipality's parks and trails, excellent amenities (shopping, hospitals, schools, etc.) and small-town feel with quiet, friendly neighbourhoods and close proximity to rural areas. Municipal services and recreation facilities also figure prominently in the list of things citizens like most about Saanich. In 2009, residents place a slightly greater emphasis on location than they did in 2006.

Likes & Dislikes (Question #2 & #3 - Continued)

When asked to name up to three things they dislike most about living in Saanich, the largest proportion continue to mention traffic congestion and road quality. The 2009 transportation rating is down slightly from 28% in 2003 and consistent with the 23% rating in 2006. Other prominent issues mentioned are municipal services, growth pressures and the lack of sidewalks.

The survey results indicate that residents continue to stress traffic volume, congestion and road quality as the main areas that impact quality of life in Saanich. In 2009, residents place a slightly greater emphasis on the lack of municipal services such as sidewalks and street lighting. Lack of snow clearing and road condition comments may have been influenced by the unusual winter conditions during the survey period.

Service Delivery

Several components are used to evaluate local government services: an assessment of the perceived quality and importance of a particular service; the citizen usage rate of a service; and finally a more general assessment of the customer service provided by Saanich employees. Results are very positive, although certainly exhibit a wide range in all three components. Saanich residents value excellent local government services, and appear generally satisfied with the selection and quality.

Quality vs. Importance of Local Government Services (Question #5)

The survey results provide a detailed assessment of 58 local government services. Each question provides slightly different information, one on service quality, and the other on service availability and appropriate resource allocation. The 2009 Citizen Survey asked respondents to rate each local government service by both satisfaction and importance. These two ratings can then be plotted onto a graph which shows four quadrants:

QUADRANT #1 (lower left): Low Satisfaction – Low Importance: Services in this quadrant may suffer from low awareness of their availability or benefits by the general population, or may offer the opportunity for resource reallocation.

QUADRANT #2 (lower right): High Satisfaction – Low Importance: These services may require little attention or may even offer an opportunity for resource reallocation.

QUADRANT #3 (upper left): Low Satisfaction – High Importance: These services may require more municipal resources, better management of existing resources or a new approach to service delivery.

QUADRANT #4 (upper right): High Satisfaction – High Importance: Services in this quadrant largely meet current taxpayer expectations, both in terms of quality and resource allocation.

The satisfaction and importance results are shown in Figure 5 on the next page, indicating that 48 of the 58 (83%) listed services are in quadrants 1 and 4. Therefore the majority of local government services are meeting or exceeding taxpayer expectations in terms of quality and resource allocation.

There are 9 services in quadrant 3 with a low satisfaction/high importance rating. These services are: Sidewalks, street repair, primary sewage treatment and ocean outfall, bylaw enforcement, building inspection / permits, ease of travel by bicycle, land use planning, economic development and services for the economically disadvantaged. These services could be reveiwed to determine if more municipal resources, better management of existing resources or a new approach to service delivery is required.

The only service rated in quadrant 2 (high satisfaction/low importance) is the Municipal Golf Course. This service may offer an opportunity for resource reallocation.

Citizen Usage Rates of Selected Services (Question #6)

Use of the available services by citizens varies tremendously. Not surprisingly, leisure-type activities are used at a significantly higher frequency than other services (the exception being the golf course). A large segment of the population uses Saanich's recreation centres, libraries, parks and trails several times per year or more as shown in Figure 6 below:

Customer service (Question #11-15)

Over 50% of survey respondents report having had a personal contact with a Saanich employee in the past 12 months. The two most common ways to interact with Saanich employees are: by telephone (79% of all reporting interactions), and in person at a Municipal facility (59%).

Those respondents who have had a personal contact with an employee were then asked to rate the customer service provided by that employee in five standard customer service evaluation criteria: were they treated fairly, were staff knowledgeable and competent, whether staff went the extra mile to make sure they got what they needed, did the customer wait a reasonable amount of time and were they informed of everything they had to do to get the service.

Survey respondents report high levels of satisfaction with the customer service provided by Saanich employees. Average scores of 74 to 84 are consistent with the scores of other local governments. Of greater relevance to customer service evaluation is the "performance gap" between the customer's satisfaction with the level of service they receive and the importance the customer places on that service level. Staff will be reviewing these performance gaps to determine appropriate actions plans to address them.





Local Government

Revenue Sources (Question #7)

Currently, a large majority of respondents continue to support the same level of reliance on property taxation as a source of revenue. The comparative chart below supports a return to the trend to place an increased reliance on government grants. Survey trend data indicates a steady increasing trend toward maintaining the same levels of reliance on property taxation and user fees.





Taxes and Service Levels (Question #8)

Results show that a majority of taxpayers are satisfied with the current level of services and appear unwilling to trade a tax increase for increased services.

Capital Projects Spending (Question #9)

When asked how they would spend \$100 on a list of capital projects, survey respondents say that they would spend the most on transportation infrastructure, mirroring concerns raised in earlier sections. Followed closely behind transportation are the water, sewer and storm drainage systems then parks and trails along with sidewalks and environmental protection.

"Soft" recreation infrastructure such as parks and trails appears to be more favoured than "hard" recreation infrastructure such as recreation or arts/cultural centres, again mirroring a previous question showing that citizens use parks and trails more often than other forms of municipally supplied leisure infrastructure.

Economic Conditions (Question #10)

When citizens were asked to provide specific actions that the Municipality could take, recognizing uncertain global and local economic conditions, a wide variety of responses were received. The suggested actions ranged from "control costs" to "upgrade infrastructure". A thematic analysis of the comments shows that the top three suggestions were:

Citizen engagement (Question #16-17)

The survey asked respondents about their existing and preferred methods of access to municipal information, how they would like to be involved in the decision making process, and if the District of Saanich is receptive and responsive to citizen engagement.

Respondents identified the Saanich News (22% of respondents) and the Victoria Times-Colonist (17%) as the two most important ways they wish to access information about municipal issues. Word of mouth, TV and radio are the next most important, but lag the top two significantly in the 11% range. Municipal publications (such as brochures) and the Saanich website are favoured by less than 9% of respondents. See Appendix III for complete list of responses.

Finally, respondents were asked to rank citizen engagement practices of the District of Saanich – how well does Saanich welcome and listen to citizens. These rankings for 2009 show a return to 2003 results perhaps a reflection of the increased citizen involvement in events during the Saanich Centennial in 2006.

E-Government and E-Commerce (Question #5, #6, #16 and #17)

Citizen use, satisfaction with, and perceived importance of the existing municipal website show a steady increase when compared to the 2003 and 2006 surveys. The addition of on-line services such as recreation class registrations and online payments for municipal services have been very well received according to our actual web site visitation statistics. See Appendix III for a complete summary of results to these questions.

Survey Development and Administration

The Centre for Public Sector Studies (CPSS) at the University of Victoria, Council, Saanich's Management Group and all municipal departments collaborated to design this survey. This combination of internal and external input to the survey design has provided us with expert-level knowledge and objectivity from CPSS survey methodologists, as well as the detail and focus that only Council and staff can provide.

For the most part, the standards for local government citizen surveys established by the US-based International City/County Management Association (ICMA) in their resource manual, *Citizen Surveys*, were used in the development of this survey. Sections of the survey also adapted the guidelines for customer service measurement established in the Institute for Citizen-Centred Service *Common Measurements Tool*.

The 2009 Citizen Survey was updated to reflect operational changes with the kind assistance of representatives from all municipal departments and is based on the 2003 and 2006 methodologies. The 2009 project was guided by Debby Harris, Corporate Projects Coordinator for the District of Saanich. The 2009 survey results were reviewed by Dr. Steven Glover of the Faculty of Management at Royal Roads University.

On January 7, 2009, citizen surveys were mailed to 1,500 households in Saanich, accompanied by a cover letter signed by the Mayor and a postage-paid return envelope (see Appendix V for survey instrument).

Households were selected using the Saanich Municipal Property Database. A randomized selection method was used. The algorithm took into account the number of households required to achieve statistically significant results (sample size), and the number of households within each local area to be geographically representative of the entire Saanich population based on the 2006 Census. The advantage of using addresses generated from the Saanich Municipal Property Database over the Yellow Pages Group List Services (as was used in previous surveys) is that all Saanich addresses are included, including those without a telephone directory listing.

Although surveys were not addressed to individual household members – the word "Resident" was used as the addressee - actual survey respondents within the household were selected through the unbiased "birthday method" sampling procedure. The birthday method requests that the respondent in the household be the adult (age 18 years old or older) who most recently had a birthday, irrespective of the year of birth.

Of the 1,500 surveys mailed out, the following were received by invalid survey recipients: 38 were returned as undeliverable, 25 due to lack of an occupied dwelling, while the remaining 13 addresses did not include the suite number within the condominium complex.

Subtracting invalid survey recipients leaves a total of 1,462 valid survey recipients. Responses were due by January 27, 2009, at which time 489 completed surveys had been returned, translating to a 33.4% response rate. Response rates for municipal surveys of this kind are typically between 25% and 40%.

Sampling Error & Statistical Reweighing

Sampling Error

Sampling error is a statistical estimate of how much the sample results are expected to differ from results obtained if every person in the municipality was sampled. The overall maximum sampling error (sometimes called "margin of error") for the 489 individuals who responded is plus or minus 4 percent at a 95 percent confidence interval. In other words, in 19 out of 20 such samples, survey results will differ by no more than 4% from results obtained if every individual in the District of Saanich were surveyed. Subgroups like age groups, place of residence or gender can be analyzed, although because they contain fewer respondents than the total, the size of the sampling error may increase.

Statistical Reweighing

<u>No</u> statistical reweighing of results was done to attempt to better match the demographic characteristics of survey respondents with those of the population. Demographic differences between the sample and the population were judged to be not significant enough to warrant the additional time and expense required for statistical reweighing. In almost all questions, results are provided for each demographic group, allowing survey readers to make their own judgements on the differences present. The sample is underrepresented by respondents under the age of 44, and by respondents who are renters. *See Appendix I for demographics.*

"No opinion" / "Not Sure" Responses

On many of the questions in the survey, respondents may answer "no opinion" or "not sure". The proportion of respondents giving this reply is shown in the full set of responses included in Appendix I. However, these responses have been removed from the analyses presented in the body of the report. In other words, most tables and graphs display only the responses from respondents who had an opinion.

For several questions (#7, #11, #17), "no opinion / not sure" responses were <u>not</u> removed. These questions had unusually high rates of "no opinion / not sure" responses compared to other questions. The "no opinion" numbers are provided, but not included in the calculation of the averages for these questions. It appeared that in these questions, a "no opinion / not sure" response may be relevant to a report reader.

Putting Evaluations onto a 100-Point Scale

Although responses to many of the questions were made on a 5 point scale with 5 representing the best rating and 1 the worst, many results in this summary are reported on a common scale where 0 is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported "very good" then the result would be 100 on the 100-point scale. Likewise, if all respondents gave a "very poor" rating, the result would be 0 on the 100-point scale. If the average rating was "good," then the result would be 75 on a 100-point scale; "neutral" would be 50 on the 100-point scale; and, "poor" would be 25 on the 100-point scale. In most cases ratings have been rounded to the nearest whole number for reporting purposes.

Save Madrona farm! *The municipality should continue to enable people to use alternate forms of transportation walking (sidewalks), riding (bike lanes and trails), and public transit (more buses).
- 1.Building permit wait times need to be decreased. 2.Firefighter should be skeleton staff on site and the rest paid on call. - A curling facility would be a good addition to the parks & recreation facilities already present in Saanich
- After moving from Central Saanich almost 5 years ago where there are no municipal services such as garbage and leaf collection and taxes were equivalent to Saanich rates, I am thankful to live in a municipality that actually seems to care about its residents and offer value for tax dollars paid. Keep up the excellent work.

I hope 2009 brings wiser & more sensitive decision making by Council. 2) Keep up the surveys to stay in touch with citizens.
- As a small business owner who is disabled the \$100 business license is onerus. A sliding scale according to tax return would be fairer. -

Bicycling is extremely dangerous as bike paths on streets full of debris, and lanes start & stop in middle of route -Nasty threats of fines if bus. License not paid for even tho business hasn't even commenced is unwarranted and dictatorial - Amend the height of fencing to fight noise pollution - Fences could be a lot higher.

- As property assessment & double occupancy houses with the side effects of strain on facilities & neighbourhoods it is becoming increasingly difficult for low-income families & seniors to compete with these existing circumstances. Regular & frequent in home assessments may boost permit income for Saanich.
- As you can see we enjoy living in Saanich. We do not want the motor "ban" on Elk Lake. Fishing dock on Prospect Lake "please." P.S. Please fix the soundsystem in the gym at Cedar Hill Rec. Thank you
- At crosswalks install traffic lights red, amber green. "do not install flashing amber lights"
- Bad air quality in moist weather after 5pm in the winter is a problem all over Saanich and makes being outdoors very unpleasant. This air gets in our homes, too! The municipality is NOT pedestrian-friendly enough.
- Bare land stratas homeowners pay same taxes yet don't have same services on "private" roads, especially snow clearing, road maintenance, utility lines etc.
- Before you allow one more condo to be built, you must improve roads and intersections.
 VITP is planning a huge expansion into beautiful greenspace and fields, yet the roads around there are in gridlock and the municipality is doing nothing to improve it.
- Better road service (cleaning roads) in wintertime / snow and ice - must include small roads! More than 5 small chickens would be nice. Check safety of the young ones to and from school.
- Building & Inspection. Second hand information indicates there is often a difference between Inspectors, and also there are demands made that are not required by the building code. Overall it does require a review of procedures. It is often less costly for contractors to do the extra work than request a review of requirements. This of course makes it necessary to add extra costs for all Saanich projects.

I've seen them on videop, very good treatment.
- Educate the police, training, their judgements and attitude, behavior, we don not want police rookies with no education and judgement of people and with bully behaviour, also poor attitude in public. (As Saanich Police). No bullism.
- Emergency response is very important for Saanich and yet I have not heard about any action to be taken with respect to Public Work Yard.  move to fast in providing housing for some
 types of street people especially the ones
 whom have had no intentin or desire to change
 their lifestyle but instead to constantly try our
 weak polical system (tents in parks) -etc etc

- I feel that Saanich is not developing in a sustainable way taking into account our changing climat & the impact this is having on the future of available clean water.

- I very much enjoy living in Saanich!
- I walk around the Cedar Hill Golf course many times in a week. I often walk alone and will avoid this walk frequently because it does not feel safe in the heavily bushed areas. I am aware of some safety issues in the past there, so I always enter these areas with discomfort ** I would like to request the bushy areas (not trees) be thinned a little to make the area a little more open and safe. 2- Also in my walks, I often go thru the paths ending up crossing Blenkinsop where Judge intersects, leading to more paths. There are often other people crossing at this location and it is not safe as it is very difficult to see cars coming in one of the directions and it is very busy. Ther are no crosswalks close by to use. ** I would like to request a pedestrian crosswalk, with lights that can be activated, be placed across Blenkinsop at Judge.
- I want change. I want the LIFE program to include recreation courses to be allowed to be taken at interchangeable municipalities such as drop ins are allowed for exercise classes, swimming, sports
- i was pleasently surprised to see our road was plowed. first time ever.
- I would appreciate Saanich cutting the thistles on the berm tops of Rainbow Park before they come into flower as well as dandelions.
- I would appreciate sidewalk access on Wilkinson Road also-the poor like riders there's no room for them on Wilkinson Road which is a major road.
- I would like to see Saanich adopt a bylaw such as the one in View Royal & City of Victoria for legalizing secondary suites. There is a shortage of rental units in Saanich. Thank you.

- I would like to see the speed limit on Reynolds Rd., between Cedar Hill X Rd. And Reynolds Court, reduced to 40 kmh. Then reduced to 30 kmh from Reynolds Court to Quadra. There is Reynolds Park near Cedar Hill X Rd. And a school crossing at Borden St.
- I'd like to see car drivers held more accountable for their actions. When walking on the sidewalk or crossing in a cross-walk becomes a life or death event something needs to be done.

- If suites are to be tolerated owners should be required to provide off street parking. If not a municipal parking permit should be required at a cost.
- If we reduced our yard and garden waste at home in our own yards, we could save money overall. I have noticed many people on Saturdays dumping lawn clippings and other easily compostable debris. Perhaps an educational brochure put out on Saturday ath the landscape dump to reduce yard waste dumping can save Saanich money.
- I'm extremely concerned about the possibility of a sewage treatment plant in my "backyard." This is not the solution, Haro Woods should be a protected natural greenspace which we have only limited amounts.
- In my opinion the urban containment boundary requires review and extension. Certain developments such as Camosun College, Pacific Sport Institute and Vancouver Island Tech have been approved with little improvement to road/traffic pattern planning and improvement. These developments have had a negative impact on residential neighbourhoods creating traffic congestion.

Your letter dated July 22, 2008 to homeowners re notice of Increase in Water Pressure, which was received Aug 4, 2008. Surely a project of this size was planned well in advance. Do you think it fair to homeowners we were given only one month to have this valve installed???
- More sidewalks and improve the website. Adding RSS feeds was a good move. Would like to see Saanich engage more in social networking - Twitter, Facebook and other ways to engage community in a time and manner that is comfortable to the constituents. Streamed and archived video of council meetings, creating transparency of process and generally making it easier using technology for me to engage with the municipality.
- More walking, bike trails, recreation, we need to capitalize on our natural beauty and connect trail systems for hikers, bikers, joggers etc. Connect uvic, to Mt Doug, to Royal Oak to Elk Lake etc. LESS MAYORS, less bureaucratics, more trails

- Please keep bicycles OFF sidewalks. Some control of bicycles on the Galloping Goose. Often it seems pedestrians are an after thought eg. Crummy "sidewalk" on Arbutus Rd. Pedestrian lights that are slow to change floral display in many "islands" are a waste of money
- Please licence bicycles for those over 16 years of age.
- Please look into raising revenue from suites such as Langford. I see my taxes increasing to a point I can no longer afford while all residents of suites everywhere are accessing services for free. Eg. Schools, bus, etc. Please look into this matter seriously. Thanks.

Don't allow anymore Tuscancy Villages with surface parking. Make it easy to walk, even when it snows! Great Survey! Thanks for asking!
- The department that looks after the floral displays and landscape plantings for Saanich should be commended. Throughout the community they are greatly enjoyed. Bravo!
- The last council vote that gave the Uptown developers permission to reduce parking without giving back to the community was short sighted. It seemed to be based on fear of economic uncertainty. Now is the time for Saanich (and Canada) to take a strong leadership stance that what is best for the economy has to be in-line with our communities & environment.

- We appreciate the opportunity to participate in the survey
- We are a garden city Plants make better air for us to breath and improve the environment The deer are eating everything. Address this problem. How about some education for bike lanes, rules responsibilities licence bikes (for motorist & bikes) Education for walkers (because there are so few sidewalks) bikers and motorists to share the roads safely
- We are very concerned that Royal Oak does not have a community centre and park (green space) near the business centre. The proposed development on the old school house property is not considering the needs and wants of the community. It is evident that at all public hearings and council meetings most of the councillors under the strong influence of the mayor, and developers, come to the meetings, having already decided how they will vote on many issues. Regardless of the number of residents who express concerns about quality of life in Saanich, especially overdevelopment, they are not being respected for their opinions and ideas. An effective council must have a sense of vision and comprehensive planning for today and for the future. Council, please consult with, and listen to, the profound concerns of the people who live in the many Saanich neighbourhoods.
- We are very unhappy with 2 major issues that directly affect us: 1. Saanich contemplating interurban as a truck route and failing to notify us & failing to enforce traffic -allowing trucks on the road every day in contravention of the existing road designation. 2. Lack of municipal water and sewer services with no accompanying property tax reduction.
- We enjoy living in saanich and feel we are being looked after quite well. But, you need to always strive to do better! (so do we!)
- We have recently moved back to canada after a 10 year absence. Some of the answers we gave are what we anticipate in doing and also have been affected by the recent weather conditions.
- We live in a townhouse on wilkinson road. The traffic is noisy even into the night. Would be good to have more evergreens planted next to sidewalk to deaden noise and keep pollution away from house.
- We moved to this community for scenery and for ease of access to highways, airport & city. This is a great place for family and for outdoor activities. We like the semi rural atmosphere. Thanks for asking my opinion!
- We need to reduce traffic congestion and one way to do this would be to build an "overpass" at mckenzie Ave and Hwy One. With both

provincial and federal governments willing to spend on "infrastructure" during the current economic situation, it may be a good time to seek their cooperation.

- We saw adjacent roadways in china parallel to roads for vehicles. Those narrower roadways were separate but running parallel for bicycles, donkeys, horses - usually separated by boulevard (rather than painted white line) Bicycle ways were always paved and less stressful for vehicle drivers and bicycles to not share same road. I commend Saanich Mayor and Council for running everything so well. In my perfect world I would like -separate bikeways (less stressfurl for bikers and vehicle drivers) -noise bylaw (cars without mufflers and motorcycles) - mandatory vehicle checks animal control operating every weekday. Thank you
- We understand that mckenzie is a provincial roadway, but please put pressure on the BC government to clean, weed the boulevards, pick up garbage & pick up cigarette butts (corner of mckenzie & Glanford is a median ashtray). - We would like to receive the Saanich News more often than once every 2 weeks (or so) felt very isolated during the snow season - the street was not ploughed or sanded for over a week thank you
- We would use bike lots if lanes were like Holland & Sweden
- When are you starting to work towards amalgamation?
- With the number of cars parked on the streets ib residential areas... Maybe you could charge

for parking as in some kind of yearly ticket/sticker. It would generate income and/or maybe get cars off the street and into garages. Our street is often a bottleneck especially down near Burnside where parked cars block visibility & are a dangerous nuisance. Q 16 -Other: Pamphlets

- Would be happy to see our roads maintained to a higher level of safety - less little round-abouts & dividers. Waste of taxpayers money. In my opinion a "make work" project. ALSO when projects - Lochside Trail are landscaped - maintained to keep weeds, etc. Out!!!
- Would it be possible to redistribute some of the police force from traffic enforcement to where it would be better used?
- You'll notice my less than great ratings for Saanich's rec centres. I've found that Esquimalt - pool, rec & Archie Browning are shining examples of great places for recreation. Saanich's might be "bigger & better", but Esquimalt has a more "people pleasing" atmosphere. Suggest your rec centres check out what Esquimalt is doing so much better than they are.
- Youth crime and vandalism are a plague in Saanich. Much more effort needs to be made policing the streets, apprehending young offenders, and as well ticketing speeders. It is not acceptable for police to say they will not enforce speed limits in our area because we don't have enough accidents!
