

### **Website Public Opinion Poll – Economic Conditions**

### Results Report - March 6, 2009

On February 4, 2009, a public opinion poll was opened on the municipal website encouraging citizens to share their ideas and opinions about the current economic conditions. Citizens were asked to answer a single question:

RECOGNIZING UNCERTAIN GLOBAL AND LOCAL ECONOMIC CONDITIONS, PLEASE LIST THREE SPECIFIC ACTIONS THE MUNICIPALITY COULD TAKE:

By the March 4, 2009 response deadline, 70 completed forms had been received, providing 189 individual comments.

The suggested actions ranged from "control costs" to "request more government grants". A thematic analysis of the comments shows that the top five suggestions were: Control costs, upgrade infrastructure, promote social and affordable housing alternatives, green initiatives and maintain current levels of service. A complete listing of the comments by category starts on the following page. The complete results are summarized in the table below:

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**Note:** The comments provided below are exactly as submitted by respondents. Only <u>very</u> minor editing and combining of individual responses has taken place.

### **Upgrade infrastructure** (23) comments

- accelerate any infrastructure projects
- any infrastructure spending should also address both long term operating costs and the environment, e.g. solar heating on the rec center pools
- continue to or increase investment in infrastructure, mobility, sidewalks and transportation.
- finish gorge tillicum traffic calming plan
- public works projects which would create jobs and improve infrastructure
- accelerate capital projects with federal \$\$\$
- increase public works spending.
- public works projects
- borrow funds at historic low rates to improve infrastructure
- hire people to improve sidewalk and crosswalk pushbutton access for those using disabled mobility vehicles
- infrastructure upgrades and repairs storm/sewer/road/water
- invest in longterm infrastructure solutions
- keep the "shovels" working in shovel ready projects
- maintain roads sidewalks etc
- match federal and provincial infrastructure funding
- make maximum use of infrastructure money
- proceed with necessary infrastructure upgrades - fdr had it right 60 years ago.
- spend on infrastructure while materials and labour costs are lower and available

- step up infrastructure projects: sidewalks and roads
- take advantage of every federal and provincial funding announcement to update saanich's infrastructure.
- traffic calming initiatives
- undertake road works to ease vehicle conjection
- direct capital expednitures to revenue generating projectsexpenditures should concentrate on essential projects such as roads, water etc. vs. arts, parks etc. during poor economic conditions.

## Maintain current levels of service (14 comments)

keep property taxes level, no increase to 2008 rates

- maintain existing infrastructure, don't add more
- no increase in property taxes or water, sewer, etc. cost and fees
- no property tax increase
- maintain existing services and ongoing grants
- minimize any increases in property taxes
- no tax increases on residential property
- · property tax freeze.
- recognize taxpayer's inability to pay tax increases
- · small or no tax increases
- taxes keep property tax increases as low as is feasible
- price freeze at rec centres.
- maintain regular employee levels
- maintain the practice of planting beautiful flower gardens on roadways, intersections and other common areas. this contributes to making saanich a desirable place to live, which in turn keeps all our property values (and municipal taxes) from falling.

# Control costs / Improve efficiency (43 comments)

- allow for competition in currency - enforce through bylaws
- be fiscally prudent by not expanding service offerings.
- finish all of the planning initatives that have been started over the years, so that when the economy turns aaround saanich is ready to move forward.

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- concentrate on producing public goods that the vast majority wants rather on what a few rich tax payers want which is more policing and more car culture.
- consider efficiencies, staff and service intergration and consolidation. wage freeze for the staff earning over \$ 75,000. reduce training, travel and discretionary costs.
- consider modest service cuts (i.e.: require curbside placement of garbage)
- do not reduce contributions and amenities required from developers unless there are clear and enduring benefits to all.
- · don't plant as may flower
- don't waste money on useless program. i.e. bike to work week.
- eliminate discretionary city expenditures
- eliminate discretionary spending
- freeze wages
- fund only necessary expenditures, zero nonessential
- get rid of expensive public goods that gov't can't afford,thus forcing them to charge for it,thus leaving it for the rich minority.
- hiring freeze
- i think that one of the most critical actions the municipality could take is to reduce costs rather than increase taxes (particularly since the property values were frozen at a historical high), even if that means eliminating or reducing some service levels, as long as there was a well-advertised, well-thought-out public referendum to give the citizens the opportunity to prioritize the alternatives. and that the municipality commits to doing so in response.

- identify, if you have not already, key performance indicators, driven by cost measures and then meet them.
- invest in supports for struggling families
- like a ceo, if the mayor cannot control the budget then he does not deserve the salary he is recieving. cut back his salary as well as the other councel members
- limit matching grants to appications that directly support saanich
- lower building permit fees
- lower property taxes to assist homeowners
- make saanich more affordable for young families
- plan next 3 years budget to increases no greater than cpi
- create public private operations so that gov't doesn't get duped by superoverpriced goods and services.
- offer a discount on annual rec centre passes
- permit subdivision of larger lots to create more housing and ease homeowners' financial challenges.
- plan for increased interest rates, a decrease in bond value, lots of inflation. reduce taxes.
- promote youth employment including those graduating university
- reduce cost of street lighting by shutting off earlier in the a.m.
- reduce costs and/or programs
- reduce costs by not taking credit card payments - the merchant fees alone at 2.5 -4% are probably quite significant.
- reduce grants to nonessential activities
- reduce income tax
- reduce services (especially the parks department)
- · reduce staff

- reduce studies. i.e. carb footprint
- reduce unessential public works projects (i.e. non essential garden boxes and paths through parks)
- reduce wages
- review recreation programming-i understand sometimes 50% of programs are cancelled-yet, kinderprograms have ridiculous waiting listsreallocate!
- shorten work week rather than lay off key employees
- simplify planning/zoning applications
- take the money set aside for infrastructure and invest it in "shovel ready" projects immediately.

### Promote green initiatives (17 comments)

- alternate energy infrastructure
- eliminate building inspection, etc. fees for people improving the carbon footprint or other environmental impact aspects of their homes
- green transportation amenities
- incentives to continue to build in saanich and rebates for using reclaimed and recycled materials.
- investing in green technology
- make public lands available for community gardens.
- more green infirstructure then hard enginerring practices to cut costs to future generations
- only invest in infrastructure projects which also contribute to lowering greenhouse gases ie. sidewalks, bike paths, tree planting etc.
- approve the use of electric cars such as the zenn

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- ban the sale and use of pesticides
- only spend on infrastructure that promotes safe, green travel.
- pre-paid parking permits in large park parking lots near transit lines for downtown commuters; 'park'n'ride' scenario supporting sustainability. presumably park usage times don't peak at the same time as commuter parking.
- solar panels to power various energy consuming necessities (city hall, street lights, etc)
- the use of a natural water regime to reduce capital cost for drainage.
- use more efficient vehicles, get employees to not idle them when parked
- while there are immediate economic challenges, the long-term crisis is the environmental/climate crisis. the municipality should help and promote citizens to enhance fuel efficiency and protect our environment.
- working with other munis to develop green transportation alternatives.

# Promote mobility alternatives to the automobile (12 comments)

- · bicycle lanes
- build better bikepaths+sidewalks to help easy travel

- more bike paths/lanes

# Encourage local food production (5 comments)

# Encourage business and developent (3 comments)
