Indigenous Canada Training by the University of Alberta Purpose

- Equip participants with the knowledge to engage meaningfully in reconciliation efforts, recognizing the importance of Indigenous rights and the need to address historical injustices.

Learning Outcomes

- Gain a broad understanding of the diverse histories, traditions, and worldviews of Indigenous peoples in Canada.
- Critically analyze the effects of colonization on Indigenous communities, including
 policies such as the Indian Act, residential schools, and other colonial practices
 that continue to shape Indigenous experiences today.
- Learn about the current social, economic, and political challenges faced by Indigenous communities, including issues related to land rights, governance, health, and education.
- Develop greater cultural awareness and sensitivity, learning how to engage respectfully and thoughtfully with Indigenous peoples, cultures, and knowledge systems.
- Become equipped with the knowledge and skills to support meaningful actions toward repairing historical injustices and fostering respectful relationships.

- Develop greater empathy and respect for the challenges faced by Indigenous communities and the importance of their cultural heritage.
