




New Online Exhibit: Royal Oak Neighbourhood Timeline!

Did you know?

Beaver Lake became the water source for the City of Victoria 1875. When in additional lines were added to the water system, a significant amount of mud and silt was drawn out with the water. Filter beds were constructed at the south end of Beaver Lake to separate the dirt from the clean water to be pumped to the city.

Pictured: Water works and filter beds at Beaver Lake, after 1886 (2010-030-008)






History Highlight


The property at 620 Judah Street was owned by Walter & Sarah Mepham Lavender, and later by their son Leslie John Lavender and his wife Bernice. Walter and Sarah Lavender immigrated to Saanich in 1912. They had two sons. though unfortunately older son died in 1914 scarlet of fever at age 7.

The younger son, Leslie, worked on the property all his life. Leslie sold part of his property to the government to build a postal station, but he died in 1976 soon after the sale. After Bernice Lavender died, the rest of the property was sold, the original house was demolished, and the Lavender Estate Housing Project was built.
