Butterfly Garden

The District of Saanich's Butterfly Garden has plants and habitat dedicated to providing for local butterflies during all stages of their life-cycle. The garden is hand-weeded, no chemicals are used and the leaf mulch provides all the fertilizer that is required. Insect damage is tolerated as the plants have been provided for food so the caterpillars can become butterflies!



The Plants

Many gardens offer nectar plants which generally feed adult butterflies. This garden uses mostly native plants that are known to feed specifically the larval stages of native butterflies.

The Habitat

The features ensure that all needs of native butterflies are met.

Provide shelter from wind and rain, as well as a food source. PERENNIALS Important 'host' plants that provide structure for eggs, foliage for larvea and nectar for adults. PROUND COVER Holds moisture, binds soil, and provides cover and food. Common Ringlet Butterfly Common Ringlet Butterfly Pale Swallo

- 1 Recessed areas with damp earth for a year-round water supply.
- 2 Small tray with sand for trace minerals.
- 3 Debris piles rocks and flat stones for shelter and for basking.
- 4 Mulch and leaf litter is retained to ensure that certain species have appropriate shelter for their chrysalis or 'cocoon' stages.
