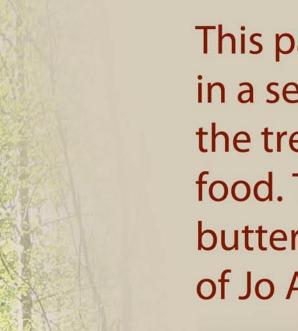

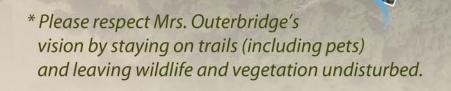
Jo Ann's Legacy

Created by Joan (Jo Ann) Outerbridge in her late 60s and 70s, this park evolved out of nine properties she bought along Blenkinsop and Royal Oak roads.

By subdividing and amalgamating their undeveloped portions she created this 3.8 ha (9.4 acres) property. In 2005, Jo Ann transferred the land to the District of Saanich in order to protect the sanctuary in perpetuity – the result is today's Outerbridge Park. A restrictive covenant has been registered against the land to ensure that it continues to be protected.
